A PRIMER OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

A. PURPOSE OF PARLIAMENTARY LAW AND PROCEDURE

Parliamentary procedure assists a deliberative and decision-making assembly in carrying out its purpose and aims in an orderly, fair, and expeditious manner.

It is not the purpose of parliamentary procedure to make difficult the conduct of business in an assembly, to entangle an assembly in technicalities, or to provide a channel for individuals to flaunt their parliamentary knowledge.

Parliamentary law protects six basic rights:

- 1) The right of the majority to make a decision;
- 2) The right of the minority to be heard in hopes that it may become the majority;
- 3) The right of absentees to be protected;
- 4) The right of the assembly to be comfortable and to hear;
- 5) The right of the individual member to be honored; and
- 6) The orderly consideration of one subject at a time.

B. BASIC STEPS OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

The chairman and members of the assembly are to be acquainted with and observe eight basic parliamentary steps to take care of convention business in an orderly and fair manner. They are:

MEMBERS:

- 1. Address the chair. "Mr. Chairman" (or "Mr. President")
- 2. *Await recognition*, by the chair.
- 3. *Make a motion*. "I move that..."
- 4. *Second* the motion. (*unless not required*)

CHAIR:

- 5. *States the motion.* (Or rules it out of order)
- 6. *Calls for discussion*. (Unless motion is undebatable)

"Is there any discussion?" or "Are there any remarks?" ample opportunity must always be given for expression of opinions and for discussion.

- 7. Takes the vote. (Or "Puts the question")
- 8. States the results.

"The 'ayes' have it and the motion is carried." Or, "The 'noes' have it and the motion is lost" The vote does not go into effect until the results are announced.

BASIC PARLIAMENTARY PRINCIPLES FOR THE NEW JERSEY DISTRICT CONVENTION

- 1. A district delegate convention is a parliamentary assembly called to deliberate and to make decisions. It receives the reports of the district president, the board of directors and the committees. In addition, the convention deliberates and makes decisions on recommended resolutions of designated floor committees which have considered proposed resolutions (overtures) from congregations.
- 2. All voting delegates have equal rights, privileges, and obligations.
- 3. The vote of the majority decides. The will of a district convention is determined by the taking of a vote.
- 4. Free discussion of every proposition or resolution presented for decision is an established right for all delegates, voting and advisory. To accomplish the closure of debate a delegate must gain the recognition of the chair and, without any comment for or against the pending resolution, say, "I move the previous question." If seconded, the motion is put to an immediate vote. If adopted by a two- thirds majority, discussion is terminated and the pending resolution is put to the assembly without further debate. The convention has the right to decide when it has heard sufficient discussion. This right, however, is to be exercised with restraint.
- 5. Both proponents and opponents of a given proposal have rights which must be safeguarded. The decision belongs to the majority, but the right to discuss, the right to be heard, and the right to oppose is to be upheld. A member of the majority on one question is often a member of the minority on another.
- 6. The simplest and most direct parliamentary procedure for accomplishing a purpose is to be followed rather than taking devious routes and multiple technicalities.
- 7. Every delegate has the right to know what question is before the convention and what its effect will be, for every action taken by a deliberative body is to be taken knowledgeably.
- 8. Voting delegates are not bound and are not to be bound by previous instructions of their home.

PROPOSED STANDING RULES

- 1. Each delegate, when recognized by the chairman, shall state his/her name and the congregation s/he represents.
- 2. Speakers from the floor shall be limited to two (2) minutes in addressing the convention.
- 3. Speakers will alternate, pro and con, clergy and lay person.
- 4. There will be no repeat speakers until all desiring to speak have been heard once.
- 5. While any voting delegate may call the question at any time, after every 15 minutes of debate on any one motion there shall be an automatic call of the question by the chairman.
- 6. Instead of a voice vote on motions before the convention, the chairman shall ordinarily call for the raising of the right hand.
- 7. If a substitute motion is offered, the convention shall first decide by *majority* vote whether or not to consider it. If the decision is in the affirmative and the substitute motion is adopted, the original motion fails. If the substitute motion does not receive favorable action either to consider or to adopt, the original motion will again be put before the convention.
- 8. Questions of privilege shall be addressed *in writing* to the chairman.
- 9. A limit of two (2) amendments to any resolution shall be allowed.
- 10. Members of the New Jersey District Board of Directors shall have the privilege of speaking from the floor.
- 11. Resolutions not acted on at this convention before adjournment die.
- 12. Unless covered by these Standing Rules, parliamentary procedures shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order (2011 Edition). All decisions of the Parliamentarian shall be final and unappealable.

The State of the New Jersey District – LC-MS

The New Jersey District comprises fifty congregations, with 10,892 baptized members and 9,167 communicant members and an average Sunday worship attendance around 3,718. Fifteen congregations operate a preschool ministry, five congregations operate a preschool ministry plus an additional grade, and one congregation operates a preschool through eighth grade ministry. As a Lutheran presence, we are almost invisible in a State that numbers nearly 9,000,000 residents (one out of every 822 residents is a LC-MS member).

We continue to see that many of our congregations are growing smaller in terms of both baptized and communicant membership; and that the average age of those who worship are getting older. We also know that this trend has been taking place for many, many years now, beginning already in the early 1980s. At present, of the fifty New Jersey District congregations, eight are close to closing their doors since their average worship attendance is below twenty-five now and another fifteen congregations worship below fifty members on an average Sunday morning.

The crisis situation in which we find ourselves is this: we no longer live in a churched culture but in an un-churched and de-churched culture. This state of affairs both challenges and invites God's people to acquire and possess a proper ministry balance between <u>edification</u> and <u>evangelism</u>; most importantly, to <u>become more missionary</u> in our posture and orientation toward those who are not Christians.

Pressing Ministry Challenges

Ministry challenges related to evangelism

- + how do we witness to, and evangelize, people "who are not like us" a people who have built their lives upon non-Christian narratives, especially the growing segment of the population who have "no religious or spiritual preference (31.2% of NJ residents)"
- + we struggle to reach the younger generations with the Gospel (nearly 45% of NJ residents are under the age of thirty-six <u>Millennial</u> and <u>Homeland generations</u>)

Ministry challenges related to becoming a mature disciple of Jesus Christ

+ for many Christians, their identity and mission is defined more by a "church member" mentality than by what the Scriptures have to say about "who they are in Christ" and "why they are in the world"¹

¹ The Scriptures use many different words to help us understand who we are in Christ: disciple, priest, witness, servant, steward, living letter, temple of the Holy Spirit, salt, light, etc. For example, a disciple is a believer in Jesus Christ who is an active student of God's Word, building one's life on the words and practices of Jesus Christ – someone who is stamped and fashioned in

+ for many within our congregations, who grew up within the Lutheran church, they stopped studying the Scriptures at age thirteen or fourteen when they were confirmed and have not grown in their knowledge of Christ and His way of living

Ministry challenges related to our life together as the body of Christ

- + there has been an increasing erosion in denominational loyalty since the 1970s
- + we are struggling to pay our bills, compensate our called church workers, and maintain our physical plant/properties – let alone have significant dollars for the extension of His kingdom to the ends of the earth

Ministry challenges related to living out our Christian faith before a watching world

- + we have many ex-neighborhood congregations that were established by Northern European ethnic peoples who were raised within, or were very familiar with, the Lutheran faith; however, most of these ethnic groups no longer reside in the neighborhood in which our congregations are located and we do not know how to minister to, and connect with, our new neighbors
- + we struggle to...
 - + communicate the Biblical message in oral, print, broadcast and digital culture; and how to use social media effectively for social engagement and ministry in the "public square"
 - overcome, and speak into, a culture that perceives and judges the Christian faith to be irrelevant in answering the big questions, and dealing with the day-today problems, that people have in, and with, life
 - + engage in a ministry of Christian apologetics; in other words, how to defend the Christian faith in a secularized and pluralistic culture so that we are "able to give a reason for the hope that lives within us, yet with gentleness and respect" to the many kinds of people who are trying to making sense of life, and the realities around us, without the hypothesis of the Triune God...and how to <u>be</u>, <u>live</u>, and <u>witness</u> as His people in a post-churched world

the mold of Jesus Christ and is a living witness to Him. Jesus identified two marks of a disciple: if you hold to My teaching, you are really My disciples (Matthew 7:24-27; John 8:31-32); and if you love one another (John 13:34-35).

What Is Our Reflective Response to This Present Reality?

From the very beginning of time and human history, God's fundamental mission is to save humankind; for God desires all people to be saved and come to the knowledge of their salvation in Jesus Christ (1 Timothy 2:4).

So that His mission might be accomplished in the lives of all peoples, God has entrusted His people with four ministries.

- + **an evangelistic ministry**, as they seek to evangelize large numbers of non-Christians through their life of witness and Gospel proclamation and bring them, by God's grace, to faith in Jesus Christ
- + **a maturational ministry**, as they grow up into Christ, who is the Head of the body, and become mature disciples of Jesus, who are also His stewards, servants, priests, witnesses, salt, light, and living letters
- + **an organic ministry**, as they are connected to each other in relationships that live out the "one another" admonitions of the New Testament, with each believer using his or her gifts for the building up of the body and for the common good
- + **an incarnational ministry**, so that wherever they go, and to whomever they come into contact with, they are able to be His ambassadors and living letters, mediating His mind and word and demonstrating His love, concern and compassion for others

New Jersey District -- Four Desired Outcomes:

The New Jersey District Board of Directors has identified <u>four desired outcomes</u> that guide the ministry labors of the District President in his relationship with the professional church workers and congregational members of the New Jersey District congregations. These desired outcomes are:

- + to equip people in New Jersey District congregations for Christian leadership (Synodical emphasis: life together)
- + church workers who are spiritually mature, professionally competent and living a healthy family life (Synodical emphasis: life together)
- + to equip members of New Jersey congregations for their outreach ministries and to enable them to bring saving faith to the unchurched residents of New Jersey (Synodical emphasis: witness)
- + to encourage New Jersey congregations in their social and human care ministries (Synodical emphasis: mercy)

The following statements describe core, strategic focuses that will guide the New Jersey District during the next triennium (2018-2021) as we seek to fulfill the Lord's <u>Great Commission</u> (Matthew 28:18-20; Luke 24:46-49) and <u>Great Commandment</u> (Matthew 25:31-45; Luke 10:25-37; John 13:34-35; 1 John 4:7-12, 19-21).

Ten Strategic Focuses:

- Focus #1: a District-wide process that addresses the pressing issues and adaptive challenges that are facing Professional Church Workers and New Jersey District congregations by...
 - + clearly identifying and stating the pressing issues and adaptive challenges that we are facing together in ministry
 - + thinking biblically and theologically about these issues and challenges; and discovering what the Scriptures have to say about these things (since all theology and ministry practices are normed by Scripture)
 - + formulating an action plan that is congregationally owned and constructed; a plan that identifies the next steps to be taken...and then implementing that ministry plan
- Focus #2: connecting and networking as we form and equip ourselves for ministry in the 21st century
 - + twice a year the District President convenes a Saturday meeting for the congregational presidents of the New Jersey District so that we might grow in our leadership skills and abilities, mutually encourage each other in our leadership labors, and to discuss ways in which we can address the pressing issues that we are facing in our respective congregations
 - + pastors are invited to attend a monthly learning community led by Rev. Dick Izzard and Rev. Paul Huneke
 - + church planters, and young pastors engaged in congregational revitalization, meet weekly with Rev. Matt Peeples (Director of *the Kairos Network*)
- Focus #3: identifying twenty to thirty pastors for potential pastoral ministry service in New Jersey congregations; they will be the next generation of pastoral leaders to shape the District's ministry culture and lead it into the future

 - + *the Kairos Network* has a ministry goal of forming 100 mission leaders and planting ten churches in the next ten years, beginning in 2018
 - + mission leadership formation series Steinbronn

 - + discipleship: "who I am in Christ" and "why am I here"
 - + contextual courses

- Focus #7: design and establish a "restart" model for densely urban and suburban congregational ministry
 - + affirming and ensuring that <u>every task</u> of the Church makes sense and has a purpose only as it leads to the mission of "<u>making disciples</u> of all peoples"; the Great Commission lays a double obligation upon the ministry of the church:
 - + the strengthening of present disciples in their already existing discipleship through <u>edification</u>
 - + proclaiming the Gospel to those who are not yet His disciples with the hope that they will become His disciples through <u>evangelism</u>
 - + *the Kairos Network* has a ministry goal of forming 100 mission leaders and several of these mission leaders could be sent to help a congregation experience a new chapter of ministry in that place
 - + participation in a revitalization process that seeks to discover and assess...
 - + local institutional factors such as "what kind of church are we...why do we do what we do...what are supposed to be doing"
 - + local contextual factors such as "who is my neighbor...am I my brother's keeper...what is happening in the world outside of my church's walls"
 - + local institutional strategies such as "what kind of church would we like to be according to the Scriptures...where do we begin, when, and with whom"
 - + local contextual strategies such as "redeveloping a missionary mindset for North America and how to proclaim the Gospel to people who have embraced, and who live by, non-Christian and non-Trinitarian core allegiances and narratives
 - + exegeting one's congregation and community in order to know and understand their core beliefs, core values and communal life ways
 - + discerning ways of talking and living that communicates the Gospel into the minds and lives of those who are disconnected from Christ (Romans 10:9-17; 1 Corinthians 9:19-23)

- Focus #8: exploring and embracing the counsel and practices of the five <u>Word-gifts</u> from our ascended Lord, given to equip His people for their work of edification and evangelism (Ephesians 4:11-16)
 - + disciples, as "wise scribes," know that the Scriptures are the great treasure store of <u>soteriological</u> and <u>hermeneutical wisdom</u> for making sense of the "human story"
 - + life is all about stories and every person has a story, filled with many conversations, scenes and snapshots
 - + everyone lives by a script...so how have you been scripted by your sinful human nature (1st skin) and by your culture (2nd skin)
 - + how have you gone about making sense of life's story -- for the way we understand life depends on what conception we have of the human story
 - + not all interpretations of life's story are true for many false prophets have gone out into the world -- the prophets connected with the many non-Christian and non-Trinitarian world religions, along with the many cultural "isms" of our time such as naturalism, pessimistic existentialism, secularism, positivism, etc.
 - + God has a story -- <u>the metanarrative</u> -- that makes sense of every human story...for the sacred scriptures make known two kinds of wisdom so that every human being can make sense of his or her story in light of His story and His promises of salvation in Jesus Christ
 - + <u>soteriological wisdom</u>...to make us wise unto salvation which is by grace, through faith, in Jesus Christ (2 Timothy 3:15)
 - + <u>hermeneutical wisdom</u>...to help us make sense of life's story in light of His story/stories (Matthew 13:11, 16-17, 51-52; 2 Timothy 3:16-17)
- Focus #9: developing a process to interface with, and minister to, "at-risk" congregations so that they might experience a new chapter of ministry
 - + there are ten NJD congregations that worship less than thirty people, with most of them located in densely urban contextual settings, so how can we strengthen the Word and Sacrament ministry in these congregations

- Focus #10: exploring creative and innovative ways of ministry configurations at the congregational and circuit levels
 - + approximately one-third of NJD congregations are "stand alone" congregations; that is, they can fully compensate a pastor and sufficiently fund their congregational ministry without receiving additional income from "non-congregational sources"
 - + model 1...one of these "stand alone" congregations would partner with an "at-risk" NJD congregation so that, over the next couple of years, the "at-risk" congregation could be strengthened through this ministry partnership
 - + model 2...two or more NJD congregations could come together in order to start a new congregation, with each congregation selling its facilities and finding a new worship location
 - + model 3...two NJD congregations decide to form a "dual parish" in which they are served by one pastor...the two churches come together and reach an agreement concerning worship times, office hours, and ministry expectations for the shared pastor; and then how much each congregation will contribute toward the pastor's compensation...and because each congregation is now served part-time by a pastor (thereby reducing the financial costs to each congregation), additional funds could be made available to call a part-time church worker for specialized ministry such as a "director of Christian education" or a "director of Christian outreach"
 - + model 4...five NJD congregations located in a circuit or region could "covenant" together so that they are served by three full-time pastors (and possibly a specialized staff person)
 - model 5...a NJD congregation resolves to close, entrusting its assets to the New Jersey District so that it can strengthen existing, and extend into new places, Word and Sacrament ministry and <u>gift</u> designated LC-MS 501c3 ministries like LWML, Lutheran Hour Ministries, etc. through a "memorandum of understanding" with the NJD
 - + the assets received from the closing, and property sale, of St. Luke, Elizabeth are being used to foster the church planting labors of *the Kairos Network* in urban settings like Hoboken
 - + the assets received from the closing, and future property sale, of St. John Harrison are being used to foster the cross-cultural ministry of Dr. Eric Moeller among the Spanish- and Portuguesespeaking residents of Harrison and Newark, along with gifting three designated 501c3 ministries (LWML, Lutheran Hour Ministry, Veterans of the Cross)

Christian Education

Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth! The following numbers represent the total reported enrollment in Christian education programs (Sunday school, youth group) for NJ District congregations in 2015-2016:

- 3 years old & under: 71
- 4 years old through 4th grade: 257
- 5th through 8th grade: 141
- 9th through 12th grade: 60

Congregations, facing the challenges of fewer children, increasingly disconnected families, and diminished volunteer rosters, are seeking renewal and rebirth of a Christian education ministry that shares the Gospel with children, youth, and families in practical, life-shaping and life-sharing ways. There is no perfect curriculum that will do this for you, and no "magic bullet" solution to this challenge. God's Word alone is our source of power and the content of our faith. God's Word alone is our

hope for renewal and rebirth as we face these challenges. "I did nothing; I let the Word do its work," wrote Martin Luther, reflecting on his role in the Reformation. "I simply taught, preached, and wrote God's Word; otherwise I did nothing. And while I slept, or drank Wittenberg beer with my friends Philipp and Amsdorf, the Word so greatly weakened the papacy that no prince or emperor ever inflicted such losses upon it. I did nothing; the Word did everything.... For it is almighty, and takes captive the hearts, and when the hearts are captured the work will fall of itself" (*The Second Sermon, March 10, 1522*).

Annual Resource Sharing & Training. Seven to twelve congregations attended the annual Children, Youth, and Family Ministry event in 2015, 2016 and 2017. At this event, various "home-centered, churchsupported" models of ministry were shared, and free resources made available for parent-supported confirmation ministry, outreach-focused VBS, and intergenerational service learning. Ongoing discussions are held and free resources made available on the "Home-Centered, Church-Supported Ministry" group on Facebook (join here: www.facebook.com/groups/njdfamilyfriendly).

Youth Ministry. As the number of youth in our congregations dwindles, so too, does the number of youth connected to district wide youth ministry programs. The district did not host a Winter Youth Gathering in 2018 for the first time in decades. However, new models and ministry opportunities are being born. The first-ever NJ District "Mystery Bus Tour" (August 2017) included 45 participants from six congregations. Regional youth ministry collectives are being explored, as congregations work together to build relationships and strengthen support networks among Lutheran youth and their families. The potential for dual-parish or multi-parish directors of Christian education (DCE) or Christian outreach (DCO) is great, and would be a huge support to our pastors as they seek to lead our congregations in these areas.

Please stop by the Youth Ministry table in the exhibitors' hall to pick up free resources, and get the latest info on the 2019 National Youth Gathering in Minneapolis.

Congregational Consultations. Working with a congregation's pastor and Christian education team, I have been able to provide curriculum review and support, and program planning helps for Sunday school, VBS, confirmation, youth, and adult education programs. I would love to meet with your congregation's team.

Please accept my Staff Report of my involvement with the

NJ District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod

Entitled: "Change of Life"

Prior to my eighteen years with the NJ District, I had been with a National and International Steel Company as a Marketing and Sales Representative with Carpenter Technology Corporation--- who moved me and my wife Barbara from the Chicago land area in 1969. (Change of Life #1)

After almost twenty years of employment, I was moved to form my own small Steel Company—Lahill Steel Corporation. (Change of Life #2)

Almost nineteen year ago, I had a heart attack at work, and was rushed to the hospital. After quadruple bypass surgery and nine months of recovery, we---my wife, family and I—decided on a "life change" not only for me but for us. **(Change of Life #3)** I had been the Congregation President at Calvary Lutheran in Verona and during that time, I had the pleasure of knowing the then District President, Rev. Dr. Sandman, who I reached out to for prayer and direction. His suggestions lead me to an opportunity with the LCMS and in February of 2000 I was offered a position as a Gift Counselor for both the New York and the New Jersey Districts, which I accepted. **(Change of Life #4)** After a number of years, the LCMS Foundation had a directional change and a new need developed at the NJ District, that of a "dual" role of Gift Councilor and Business Manager, which I was asked to fill. **(Change of Life #5)**

Since that time, I have not only been the Business Manager (Change of Life #6), NJ District Stewardship Leader (Change of Life #7) but also a Congregation Revitalization coach. (Change of Life #8)

Change of Life #9 was The Funding of Ministry in the New Jersey District. Over these many years, the funding started with my role as a Gift Counselor. Here, I worked with individuals from a number of the District Congregations in setting up Charitable Remainder Trusts. The trust would be funded in a variety of ways including from a directive in an estate plan; resulting with National and local Ministries having or to receive over THREE MILLION DOLLARS from these activities. I was also asked to develop two District Fund Raisers: The "Seeds Campaign" and "His Way". The proceeds from these activities of over THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND helped the continuing of ministry in the District and in extending a call to then Mission Executive now District President Rev. Dr. Anthony Steinbronn. Fifteen years ago I had a dream of bringing together individuals from various Congregations within the District that had like interests; that of a special golf outing that included a district wide fund raiser. From that dream the Mission Golf Classic was developed. We just recently completed the 14th Annual Mission Classic on May 3rd with the net proceeds going to the Kairos Network, in support of new mission and church planting initiatives. The Classic has developed scholarships, funded youth summer camp projects, assisted the Malaria initiative, Backpacks for Life, Comfort Dogs, and youth initiatives, with over a QUARTER MILLION DOLLARS being given out.

Most recently I was asked to be a Property Manager (Change of Life **#10**), as the District sadly experienced congregations that have closed. During the "Property Manager" period of closures and over my prior years of experience, I have had some varied responsibilities. During that time, sadly, I have had involvement in congregation closings at: Clifton-Plainfield-North Bergen-Harrison-Mahwah-Elizabeth-and the Clinton area.

However, most recently, I have been involved, in part, of the newly formed Ministry Management Team **(Change of Life #11)** that has been charged with helping to assist NEW MINISTRY growth within the NJ District. This final Staff role may very well be the most important activity that I have been part of to date; as the recent congregation assets that have come to the District from the various closings have been the financial support for the NEW MINISTRIES opportunities within the District.

Nineteen years ago I felt it was time for a "Life Change" and as I look to the future, I believe it is time for me, to once again, look to a **"Life Change-----Number 12".**

With that said, I have prayed to the Lord for guidance as I say to those in the NJ District—Thank You for the opportunity to serve you and the Lord.

NJ District Education report for 2018 Convention By Caren Vogt

Lutheran Education, like our churches, are experiencing difficult times in New Jersey. Although our schools are rated among the best by the state for education and reaching out to the whole family, we often miss the mark in meeting the needs of our community as a whole. We have closed two preschools in the last 3 years, 5 others are struggling to stay open and be financially stable. We have only one elementary school, Our Redeemer in Fords, who is struggling to stay open. We have four preschools currently in transition. Two are looking for new directors to lead their schools, while two others have found directors to lead their school. We want to welcome Douglas Puls as the new director at Christ Memorial and Martha Gilmore as the new director of Redeemer Preschool, Westfield. We have provided conferences each year in the spring. The Spring Educator's Conference for Pastors, DCE's, Directors and Teachers has provided trainings and CEU's with both Lutheran and Secular presenters to help our churches and schools in their ministry. An average attendance of 55 participants per year. We encourage you to send your teachers and ministry team to the annual conference, as well to make suggestions for future conferences.

Out of 20 preschools and 1 elementary only three operate with hours for working parents (6am to 6pm). The rest still have half day programs or extended programs, but they often don't meet the hours of working parents. Parents need consistent care 12 months of the year for their children. Parents also wish they can make one stop when looking for childcare for their children. Our schools need to look at school age care for siblings of preschool children in our care. Providing before and after school, holidays, school closings, and care for all ages during the summer. The schools that have made these adjustments seem to be doing well, while still maintaining a high quality educational program.

Our Churches need to be active in our schools. Our retired members could volunteer to be greeters. Welcoming parents and be encouragers. Sharing their wisdom when parents have concerns and offering prayers for the parents they meet. Members could visit new parents and welcome them to the school family and share information about the church. Keep each of the school families in the prayers of the church. Attend school functions and mingle with the parents sharing the gospel and finding out if there is any way the church can be of service to them. Members can reach out to staff and become a prayer partner with a staff member. Offer your time and talents to staff to make the school program the best it can be. Reward your hard-working staff with messages of encouragement and praise. Hold a dinner for staff and parents after a long day just to let them know you care. Doing these things and others will help you see your school in action and help you to keep the ministry of your school in the forefront of your church's ministry plan.

Please support all of schools with prayers, financial gifts, encouragements, and the many gifts and talents with which God has blessed you. Our Schools are a powerful outreach ministry into our communities. With Church and School working together the Gospel message will reach many.

REVITALIZATION Rev. Richard C. Izzard

Greg Finke in Joining Jesus on His Mission writes, "We're not on mission for Jesus, but with Jesus!" Jesus invites us to join with Him in what He is already doing. With almost ½ of LCMS Congregations winning one or less to Jesus, revitalization calls us to join with Jesus in "Seeking and saving the lost." (Luke 19:10) Recent surveys uncover the fact that many LCMS congregations do not believe that their only priority is bringing people into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ. We speak of priorities, but the word priority is singular. We can have only one priority. Once established, we can then prioritize our different ministries in support of our one priority.

Revitalization has become a "buzz" word, with many thinking of it as just another program. But revitalization is as old as God's promise in Genesis 3:15. By the precious sacrifice of Christ, from the cross to the empty tomb, we have been revitalized. With Christ having paid the price of defeating "sin, death and the devil," we are called to live in a "newness of life," (Romans 6:5) being entrusted by God with the message and ministry of reconciliation. (2 Corinthians 5:19)

Revitalization in our churches only begins when we make the simplest of all confessions, "Jesus is Lord." He is not simply a Lord, He is the Lord. He is Lord of all, or He is not Lord at all. He is Lord of each of our strategically placed New Jersey congregations. Our ministries, decisions, actions, thinking are to reflect His Lordship and His preeminence. The Church belongs to the preeminent Lord, or it is not a Church.

We who are called into fellowship with Jesus who is not only the Lord but He is also the Head of His Church. Jesus is the Head, not the Pastor, not Voters or Council, nor traditions, or personal likes and dislikes, or popular convictions, not even majority vote. Jesus is the Head of the Church. It is His direction that counts. It is His opinions that matter. It is His ideas, thoughts and judgments that are of first importance. Without His direction we can easily wander off course and forget the business we are in. And without the passion of Christ for the lost, we will never put the energy into the on-going ministry of revitalization.

Knowing Jesus is Lord and that He is the Head of the Church, we are called and commissioned to be the Body of Christ. Personally, one of the most challenging tasks in ministry was "to explain the unexplainable" love of God in Christ Jesus. But that's the genius of God calling the Church to be the body of Christ. "The Church is the only organization that exists for the benefit of others." The risen and exalted Lord returned to earth to be nearer to us than ever before. The Church becomes a body that is identical with Christ's own body. Since the ascension, "Christ's place on earth has been taken by His body, the Church. The Body of Christ becomes visible to the world in the congregation gathered round the Word and Sacrament." (Bonhoeffer's <u>Cost of Discipleship</u>) As the Body of Christ, revitalized and renewed in the Spirit we are to be "so sacrificially loving that the people around us, who don't believe what we believe, will soon be unable to imagine the community without us."

How to engage our communities is ONLY hindered by a lack of creativity and a unwillingness to let our only priority dictate our actions. There are a host of technical solutions that will help us maintain our status quo. But may we, who have been revitalized by the preciousness of God's love for us in Christ, seek diligently and passionately adaptive solutions, generated by God's Spirit in response to Christ's mission and His command to "Go, and make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28:19)

Christian Heritage Endowment Fund (CHEF)

In 1983 through a gift to the New Jersey District Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod, The Christian Heritage Endowment Fund (CHEF) was established. Its purpose was to assist the churches of the New Jersey District and its pastors to create new programs, enhance their ministries and spread the news of our Risen Lord and Savior.

At each convention of the New Jersey District, a Board of Trustees is elected to oversee the disbursement of the monies in the fund. During this past term, the trustees reviewed the By-Laws of the Fund and the formula for equitable distribution of the monies within. In 2010, the trustees invested the Fund in an annuity to provide a more reliable source of funding for disbursement during the two grant periods yearly, January 15 and August 15. This has proven to provide the consistency which was desired. This year the trustees also established a grant maximum of \$10,000. per request. Renewable grants remain renewable under this guideline.

The trustees also discussed increasing the categories for grants. After a brisk discussion, it was determined that the five categories presently utilized offer wide interpretation and thus congregations should be able to utilize them for any project being considered.

These are the categories for which grants were offered this past triennium:

- Grants for new ministry, out reach mission (3 yr. renewable)
- Grants for leadership development, house church leaders
- Grants for technology
- · Grants to assist in bringing message to the disabled
- Grants for Church Workers sabbaticals

All grants are for up to 50% of the project

In honor of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, CHEF offered a grant of \$500. for celebration events involving a minimum of two churches. We were delighted that four events were held with nine churches involved.

The members of the CHEF Board of Trustees would like to remember Mrs. Ewald Mueller. It was her initial gift which began CHEF. We were saddened to learn of her passing this past year.

The following have served as Trustees of CHEF this past triennium: Rev. Brian Handrich, Vice Chair; John Blume; Chris Koerner, District Treasurer; Steve Naumowicz; Linda Panarella and William Zak. Advisors to the Trustees were President Rev. Dr. Anthony Steinbronn and Business Manager Bill Webster.

NJ DISTRICT 2018 CONVENTION OVERTURES

Overture 1 To Ensure Timely and Transparent Financial Reporting in the Synod

WHEREAS, A principle of Biblical stewardship is to be accountable with the resources with which one has been entrusted, as expressed in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14 ff.); and

WHEREAS, Much is required of those to whom God has entrusted his gifts. As Jesus said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b, ESV); and

WHEREAS, The Scriptures teach "it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2, ESV); and

WHEREAS, The Synod has historically recognized its responsibility of accountability and faithfulness in the handling of the finances entrusted to it by its members, as is witnessed in Bylaw 1.5.4, "The Synod and each of its agencies shall fully disclose their financial books and records to any member congregation of the Synod;" and

WHEREAS, The Synod in previous conventions has expressed its opinion that such accountability and faithfulness be found additionally in regular reporting of such financial disclosure by adopting 2010 Convention Resolution 4-03, "To Broadly Communicate the Statement of Financial Position of LCMS," which reads in its totality:

"WHEREAS, It is helpful to understand the Synod's financial position and communicate it to the members of the congregations of Synod; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That each November, the Vice-President–Finance—Treasurer of the Synod use widely available means, (i.e., The Lutheran Witness, Reporter, the LCMS Website) to state the financial position of the Synod in a format easily understood by persons unfamiliar with financial terminology." (2010 Convention Proceedings, p. 120); and

WHEREAS, The members of the Synod expressed even further the need for full transparency in all areas of financial disclosure by adopting 2016 convention RESOLUTION 9-04A, "To Improve Disclosures Related to Financial Gifts from God's Stewards for Special Appeals," which stated in part,

"...WHEREAS, Monies for special appeals requested by corporate Synod (e.g., following natural disasters) are reported only in part in Synod publications (e.g., Reporter and The Lutheran Witness) and sometimes only annually; and ...

WHEREAS, Donors and members of the Synod are interested in the impact of funds raised for special appeals and will appreciate improved disclosure of results; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the financial offices of corporate Synod continue to recognize the desire of donors and members of the Synod to improve processes of reporting and work to provide clear, timely, and transparent accounting for all funding and special appeals, so that the Body of Christ

may experience the joy of Gospel-centered mission and ministry beyond the local context or community." (2016 Convention Proceedings, p. 189); and

WHEREAS, It was reported to the 2013 Convention of the Synod by the Board of Directors in its Report on the Disposition of Funding the Mission Recommendations (R6-03-01) that "the decline in the Synod's annual unrestricted revenue continues...The board believes that congregations will respond through better, open, and honest communication about the great things God is able to accomplish for His kingdom when we work together. Numerous conventions have passed resolutions calling on congregations to maintain and increase unrestricted support for district and Synod ministries, yet the unrestricted support passed through our districts to the Synod has continued to decline at the average rate of \$1 million each year." (2013 Convention Workbook 2013, p. 114-115); and

WHEREAS, In 2016, the Chief Financial Officer of the Synod, in reporting to the Synod about offerings received, stated, "This sharing from God's bounty continues to decline. Although the amount of decline in the past three years has not been as severe as the average decline of the previous 20 years, it is still trending negatively. In the face of continued declining unrestricted revenues, the ability of Synod, Inc. to respond quickly and nimbly to mission and ministry opportunities and challenges laid before us by our Lord also declines, as does our ability to "fill in the gap" when restricted revenues, needed to fund much of our mission and ministry activities, fall short of their goals. The financial challenges facing our beloved Synod persist. I believe that these challenges are of our own making, a product of how we distribute the resources provided by our loving Father." (2016 Convention Workbook, pp. 61-62); and

WHEREAS, There have been few tangible reports about the financial struggles of the Synod, such as the need to trim \$4 million dollars from the budget of the Synod (ref. July 7, 2017 Reporter, https://blogs.lcms.org/2017/international-national-mission and the May 19-20, 2017 Synod Board of Directors Minutes https://www.lcms.org/Document.fdoc?src=lcm&id=4769), these reports are less than sufficient to keep the members of the Synod regularly informed about the financial condition of the Synod; and

WHEREAS, It has been widely reported, albeit not in the official channels of the Synod communications, that the Synod has only minimal days of operating capital in its cash reserves, which would seemingly place the synod in a precarious financial position (ref. Paragraph 45, Financial Reports of the February 17-18, 2017 LCMS Board of Directors Minutes

https://www.lcms.org/Document.fdoc?src=lcm&id=4659), which stated that without funds held on behalf of the two Seminaries, Synod had only a 5 days of cash available); and

WHEREAS, In the face of such challenging financial times, transparency and regularity in reporting of the financial situation of the Synod is of upmost importance to the members and constituency of the Synod who have a vested interest in the financial viability of the Synod and who merit clear, concise, and timely reports; and

WHEREAS, The president of the synod recommended in his report to the Synod in 2016 that the synod have "Uniform Financial Reporting." (2016 Today's Business, p. 28); therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Synod in convention direct the Chief Financial Officer to report quarterly in the Synod's official publications about the financial position of the Synod in a format easily understood by persons unfamiliar with financial terminology, such reporting to include, but not limited to income and expenses, budget versus spending, cash reserves and cash position, etc.; and be it further

RESOLVED, That these quarterly reports include information about the regular Synod budget and the reporting on special appeals as stipulated in 2016 Resolution 9-04A; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Synod be shrewd managers with the resources God has given it; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the Synod give thanks to God for the resources He has entrusted to us, recognizing "That the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof" (Psalm 24:1, ESV).

To Overrule CCM Opinion 14-2724

Whereas the Texas District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, at its 2015 convention, adopted the following resolution: RESOLUTION: 02-01-15A RE: OVERTURES 02-04-15, 02-05-15, 02-06-15, 02-07-15, 02-08-15, 02-09-15, 02-10-15, 02-11-15, 02-12-15, 02-13-15 SUBJECT: TO OVERRULE CCM OPINION 14-2724

WHEREAS, the Word of God (Acts 13) clearly reveals that in the first century of the New Testament, a local congregation of believers in the Lord Jesus, assembled in Antioch, after much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, freely consecrated and sent missionaries, notably Barnabas and Saul, into mission fields; and

WHEREAS, Article III. 2 of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod identifies an objective of the Synod as to "Strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;" and

WHEREAS, Article VII of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod states, "In relation to its members, the Synod is not an ecclesiastical government exercising legislative or coercive powers, and with respect to the individual congregation's right of self-government it is but an advisory body"; and

WHEREAS, Article XIV of the Constitution states, "The Synod in convention may adopt bylaws that are consistent with and do not contradict the Constitution of the Synod, which controls and supersedes such bylaws and all other rules and regulations of the Synod"; and

WHEREAS, 2010 Synod Convention Res. 8-32B encourages the Synod to study Article VII of the Constitution, including study of "Congregations and Synod, Background Material on the Advisory Nature of the LCMS" along with opinions of the Commission on Constitutional Matters related to this topic (including CCM Opinion 09-2573 listed in a "Whereas" paragraph in Resolution 8-32B); and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-10A in a "Resolved" clause states that The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod reaffirms that its synodical polity is essentially and principally congregational in nature; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 09-2573 states in part that "... there is a common understanding that a congregation exercises its self-government ... in carrying out ... its own ministry programs and financial affairs ..."; and

WHEREAS, Synod Bylaw 3.8.3 deals only with who has authority to send ministers of religion and other workers into Synod foreign mission fields, and prior bylaws have been careful not to restrict congregational activity specifically relating to whom congregations could send funds overseas, and nothing in the current bylaws restrict or could restrict the right of member congregations to (a) fund ministries in foreign countries, or (b) send/fund congregation members for service with organizations seeking to share the Gospel; and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-37 amending the bylaws only dealt with who on behalf of Synod as a whole could send missionaries at the expense of the Synod, and where the restriction applied, it being a sending bylaw only, clearly not applicable to congregations in any event; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 referring to 2013 Synod Convention Res. 1-08, "To Work Together in Mission," called for a two-fold response: First, "Resolved, That the Synod, by the next convention, develop and provide a mission best practices policy document for districts and congregations engaged in mission projects to assist them to better carry out their mission and their life together", indicating that districts and congregations have and are recognized to have mission work and practices of their own, and because they have their own mission work and practices, the Synod should assist and support those efforts by developing a best-practices policy; and second, "that these best practices include encouragement to districts and congregations to communicate their international mission activities to the Synod's Director of

Church Relations and Offices of National and International Mission for the purposes of healthy coordination and stewardship" (underlined portions indicate emphasis added), indicating that districts and congregations can have their own mission activities and when they do they are encouraged to communicate these activities to the Synod for coordination and good stewardship; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 states in part, "Congregations may not send funds to mission societies and non-Synod entities for work in foreign areas without taking into consideration policies developed and determined for this purpose by the Board of International Mission as the only sending agency;" and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 incorrectly restricts the mission outreach of congregations and others to give bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the congregations of the Texas District and of The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod be encouraged, with much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to send missionaries to foreign areas; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Texas District affirms and encourages congregations, auxiliaries, recognized service organizations, districts, and individual members of the Synod, in their efforts to give bold witness by word and deed, to the love and work of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness to all the world; and be it further

RESOLVED, That nothing in the bylaws of Synod should ever be interpreted to limit efforts by congregations, auxiliaries, recognized service organizations, districts, and individual members of the Synod, to give bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness to all the world, but only be interpreted as requesting information which might allow Synod to support (and to assist in connecting potential support for) congregations and individual members, to assist in connecting potential mission partners, and to provide best practices information which could assist the efforts; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the Texas District in convention memorialize the Synod in convention to adopt this resolution and to overrule CCM Opinion 14-2724, to be thereby declared null and void and of no effect. Rev. Larry Krueger, Chairman Rev. Brian Hesse, Secretary

and

WHEREAS, The above resolution appears in the 2016 LCMS Convention Workbook as Overture 2-04; and

WHEREAS, Three other LCMS districts, three district boards of directors, one circuit, and seventeen LCMS congregations also adopted this resolution; and

WHEREAS, Two other overtures (2-07, 2-09) were submitted to the 2016 LCMS Convention that also requested that CCM Opinion 14-2724 also be overruled; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 3.9.2.2 (c) regarding the CCM says, in part:

An opinion rendered by the commission shall be binding on the question decided unless and until it is overruled by a convention of the Synod. Overtures to a convention that seek to overrule an opinion of the commission shall support the proposed action with substantive rationale from the Constitution, Bylaws, and resolutions of the Synod. All such overtures shall be considered by the floor committee to which they have been assigned and shall be included in a specific report to the convention with recommendations for appropriate action.

(Emphasis added)

And

WHEREAS, No such report was given to the 2016 convention of the Synod; and

WHEREAS, No disposition of these overtures whatsoever is recorded in the 2016 Synod convention Proceedings; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the resolution quoted above be submitted as an overture to the 2019 Synod convention by the adoption of this, current resolution; and be it further

OVERTURE 3

To Overrule Board of Directors' May 2017 Resolution 12-14, re Bylaw 7.1.2

WHEREAS, The 2016 Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, in its Resolution 12-14 ["Regarding the Right of an Accuser to Appeal When a District President or President of the Synod Fails to Act or Declines to Suspend"] and according to Bylaw 7.1.2, deferred its rightful and legislative authority regarding the development of ecclesiastical supervision bylaws with respect to and inclusion of the President of the Synod, the decision given to Synod's Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 12-14, in accordance with Bylaw 7.1.2, set forth a specific path and timeline for consideration, negotiation and counsel to be conducted with the Council of Presidents, with any proposed amendments to the bylaws to be reviewed by the Commission on Constitutional Matters and the Commission on Handbook; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 12-14 states that the Commission on Constitutional Matters in Op. 16-2791 "has indicated portions of the expulsion processes of Synod's Bylaws are presently in an unconstitutional state with respect to Const. Art. XI B 1–3 and Const. Art. XIII 2"; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Directors, acting under Bylaw 7.1.2 and at the express direction of the 2016 Resolution 12-14, in May of 2017 adopted changes to the bylaws of the Synod regarding ecclesiastical supervision; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution of Synod defines clearly, precisely, and fully the supervisory role of the President of Synod, wherein the President of Synod has "the supervision regarding the doctrine and the administration of a. All officers of the Synod; b. All such as are employed by the Synod; c. The individual district of the Synod; d. All district presidents" (XI.B.1); and

WHEREAS, The President of Synod, as ecclesiastical supervisor, is limited in the exercise of said power, assuming "only such rights as have been expressly conferred" (XI A.1) ["The officers of the Synod must assume only such rights as have been expressly conferred upon them by the Synod, and in everything pertaining to their rights and the performance of their duties, they are responsible to the Synod."], which are expressly conferred to be "the power to advise, admonish, and reprove…conscientiously use all means at his command to promote and maintain unity of doctrine and practice in all the districts of the Synod" (XI.B.3); and

WHEREAS, Synod's Constitution expressly confers upon the District Presidents the duty to "*exercise supervision over*" their district's ministers and to "*visit and…hold investigations in the congregations*" (*XII.7*), including the District Presidents being empowered "*to suspend from membership*" their district's ministers (XII.8); and

WHEREAS, Prior to the year 2016 and CCM Op. 16-2791, numerous CCM opinions [to wit Ag. 1970, Op.15-2750, 13-2669, 10-2581, 03-2354, and 03-2338, A and C] interpreted the President of Synod's scope of ecclesiastical supervision do not include supervision over individual workers and congregations expressed in Article XII.7,8; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That Synod in convention, as the ultimate legislative body of Synod [Bylaw 1.4.1: "The delegate convention of the Synod is the legislative assembly that ultimately legislates policy, program, and financial direction to carry on the Synod's work on behalf of and in support of the member

congregations. It reserves to itself the right to give direction to all officers and agencies of the Synod. Consequently, all officers and agencies, unless otherwise specified in the Bylaws, shall be accountable to the Synod for all their actions, and any concerns regarding the decisions of such officers or agencies may be brought to the attention of the Synod in convention for appropriate action. This provision does not apply to specific member appeals to the Concordia Plans, which has its own appeal process for such cases. "] considers the following to be steps to the resolution of this matter; and be it further

RESOLVED, That changes, subsequent to 2016 Convention Resolution 12-14, made under Bylaw 2.14 "Expulsion of Congregations or Individuals from Membership in the Synod," under Bylaw 2.15 "Expulsion of a District President or Officer from Membership in the Synod", under Bylaw 2.16 "Expulsion of a President of Synod from Membership in the Synod", and under Bylaw 2.17 "Expulsion of Individuals from Membership in the Synod as a Result of Sexual Misconduct or Criminal Behavior", as a result of 2016 Convention Resolution 12-14, as adopted by the Board of Directors (May 2017) be overruled and of no effect; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Bylaws 2.14, 2.15, 2.16 and 2.17 be returned to and replaced by the same corresponding Bylaws as set forth in the 2013 Synod Handbook; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a Blue Ribbon Task Force of seven members, with four members appointed by the 35 District Presidents, three of whom shall be District Presidents, and three members appointed by the President of Synod, be authorized and formed to conduct a thorough study of the ecclesiastical supervision matter, including Articles III, VI, VII (studies of Articles VI and VII were previously resolved by the 2010 Convention), XI, XII, and XIII, and make recommendations to the 2022 Synod Convention, including any necessary revisions of constitutional provisions, with the purpose of evangelically resolving the current difficulty and division among us; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all relevant CCM opinions such as 16-2791, 16-2793, 16-2794, 16-2797, 17-2822, 17-2828 and 17-2836 be placed in abeyance until the 2022 Convention and any necessary action at the 2022 convention; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Synod in convention affirm the powers provided to the Synod President "to advise, admonish and reprove...conscientiously use all means at his command to promote and maintain unity of doctrine and practice in all the districts of the Synod" do not include direct supervisory responsibilities of individual members of Synod, since such individuals are under the ecclesiastical supervision of District Presidents; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the convention pray for peace and harmony in the Synod as it moves forward in mission and ministry.

Resolved, the the NJ District explore, promote and facilitate ministry options for congregations to yoke together in dual parish ministries, combined ministries, regional parish models, etc, that would be served by multi-pastorates, deaconesses, DCE, etc so as to make full use of the giftedness of the church and be it further

Resolved, that the NJ District help congregations in developing creative ways to manage the resource of land and facilities, including the sale of said properties so that the current congregation could continue and thrive in a new way.

To Adopt Data Privacy Best Practices

WHEREAS, The District and Synod collect personal identity and contact information from convention delegates and from those who vote for President of Synod; and

WHEREAS, Best practices for data privacy include the safeguarding of such personal information, its use only in the official conduct of business, and strict limitations on its disclosure; and

WHEREAS, Our delegates in convention take positions at odds with the culture, making disclosure of their personal information a security concern. For example, the Family Research Council in DC and donors to California Prop 8 were attacked professionally and personally for the same positions on marriage that our delegates enacted in 2016 14-02A, 14-03A, and 14-04; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 3.12.2.3 now prohibits non-official use or distribution of the list of congregation-selected voters for President of Synod; and

WHEREAS, The Synod openly publishes the street addresses of national delegates as part of the Convention Workbook, which is posted on the Internet and easily downloaded; and

WHEREAS, The Secretary of Synod's office sells copies of this list to interested parties, which use them mainly for political ends. In 2016, some of those distributions disclosed national delegate e-mail addresses without consent; and

WHEREAS, LCMS districts have used their access to voters lists to send advocacy-type mailings and emails directly to those who vote for synod officials; therefore be it

Resolved, That the New Jersey District affirms its commitment to data privacy best practices, including protection of identity and contact information for its district convention delegates, and the use or distribution of that information only for official business and with consent of the persons involved; and be it further

Resolved, That the New Jersey District adopts a practice, consistent with LCMS Bylaw 3.12.2.3, which prohibits its use of private voter contact information in connection with synod-level elections; and be it further

Resolved, That the New Jersey District memorialize the Synod in convention to adopt practices that stop the public disclosure of delegate street addresses and require prior consent for any distribution of their personal contact information.

- WHEREAS, larger districts both geographically (SELC, encompasses 11 states and 2 Canadian provinces) and in number (Oklahoma, 82 congregations) are served by part-time district presidents who regularly also serve as parish pastor, and
- WHEREAS, the NJ District has also allowed for the district president to serve as a parish pastor, and
- WHEREAS, it would be of best stewardship of the resources that God has entrusted to the churches and the district to consider how other districts have organized themselves to best accomplish the mission of the church, and
- WHEREAS, pastors have been called in to pastoral congregational ministry and the church would lose a great resource to remove these men from the congregational ministry to serve as solely a DP, be it
- RESOLVED, that the New Jersey District President be a part-time position, both in time and compensation, and be it finally
- RESOLVED, that the NJ DP be allowed to serve a congregation as pastor.

Overture 7 To Engage in Ministry to Transgendered Persons

WHEREAS, All persons are created in God's image and are made to glorify Him (Genesis 1:27; Isaiah 43:7); and

WHEREAS, God's design was the creation of two distinct and complementary sexes, male and female (Genesis 1:27; Matthew 19:4; Mark 10:6;) which designate the fundamental distinction that God has embedded in the very biology of the human race; and

WHEREAS, Distinctions in masculine and feminine as ordained by God are part of the created order and should find expression in every human heart (Genesis 2:18, 21–24; 1 Corinthians 11:7–9; Ephesians 5:22–33; 1 Timothy 2:12–14); and

WHEREAS, The Fall of man into sin and God's subsequent curse have introduced brokenness and futility into God's good creation (Genesis 3:1–24; Romans 8:20); and

WHEREAS, According to a 2016 study from the UCLA School of Law, about 1.4 million Americans identify as transgender; and

WHEREAS, Transgenderism differs from hermaphroditism or intersexualism in that the sex of the individual is not biologically ambiguous but psychologically ambiguous; and

WHEREAS, The state of New Jersey prohibits licensed counselors from any attempt to change a child's "gender expression"; and

WHEREAS, the church does not have a good history at ministering to transgendered persons often due to our uncomfortablity with the topic or harsh, unloving, hypocritical manner in which we speak to them often while refusing to speak publicly against other sexual sins such as divorce, remarriage, pornography, sexual harassment, coarse language, etc, and

WHEREAS, the CTCR has produced a 2014 paper entitled, "Gender Identity Disorder or Gender Dysphoria in Christian Perspective" which begins to address this topic; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the NJ District in convention affirm God's good design that gender identity is determined by biological sex and not by one's self-perception—a perception which is often influenced by fallen human nature in ways contrary to God's design (Ephesians 4:17–18); and be it further

RESOLVED, that we commend the CTCR for their current work and request they produce a full study on practical ministry to transgendered persons, and be it

RESOLVED, That we grieve the reality of human fallenness which can result in such biological manifestations as intersexuality or psychological manifestations as gender identity confusion and point all to the hope of the redemption of our bodies in Christ (Romans 8:23); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we extend love and compassion to those whose sexual self-understanding is shaped by a distressing conflict between their biological sex and their gender identity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we invite all transgender persons to trust in Christ and to experience renewal in the Gospel (1 Timothy 1:15–16); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we love our transgender neighbors, seek their good always, welcome them to our churches and, as they repent and believe in Christ, receive them into church membership (2 Corinthians 5:18–20; Galatians 5:14); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we regard our transgender neighbors as image-bearers of God and therefore condemn acts of abuse or bullying committed against them; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we oppose efforts to alter one's bodily identity (e.g., cross-sex hormone therapy, gender reassignment surgery) to refashion it to conform with one's perceived gender identity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we continue to oppose steadfastly all efforts by any governing official or body to validate transgender identity as morally praiseworthy (Isaiah 5:20); and be it further

RESOLVED, That our love for the Gospel and urgency for the Great Commission must include declaring the whole counsel of God, proclaiming what Scripture teaches about God's design for us as male and female persons created in His image and for His glory (Matthew 28:19–20; Acts 20:27; Romans 11:36).

Overture 8 To Combat Racism within the Church and Society

WHEREAS, Scripture teaches, "God made from one man every nation of mankind to live on all the face of the earth," (Acts 17:26); and

WHEREAS, All people are created in the same image of God, no matter what human distinguishing identifiers might be (Gen. 1:26-27; 9:6; cf. Acts 17:25, 26) and

WHEREAS, central to the doctrine of creation is the truth of the equal value of all humans grounded in the unsurpassable worth that God places in them, demonstrated by the unsurpassable price he paid for each individual person, and

WHEREAS, In Jesus, God became a human and so identifies fully with every human (Hebrews 2:17), not only Israel but all of humanity and that his mission embraces all of humankind (Matt. 1:1-17; Luke 3:23-38), and

WHEREAS, Any claim that there is something about the nature of another human being as such that renders that person to be of inferior value not only denies the biblical doctrine of creation, but also calls into question what the Scriptures teach about the incarnation of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As a human, Jesus descended from Adam, whom God created (Luke 3:38), and whom all human beings have as progenitor. To deny the full humanity of any fellow human being is at the same time to compromise the apostolic truth that in Christ "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" (Col. 2:9), that is, that he truly "was made man" (Nicene Creed).

WHEREAS, Jesus Christ has removed all barriers between all human beings, making peace through His cross (Eph. 2:13-16), and

WHEREAS, The Apostle Peter said, "God doesn't show favoritism, but in every nation the person who fears Him and does what is right is acceptable to Him" (Acts 10:34–35); and

WHEREAS, The Book of Concord teaches that all Christians will make the will of Christ supreme in their own lives and in human society, and so opposing all forms of racism (AC Ap V 1-3,)

WHEREAS, ""That to which your heart clings and entrusts itself," Dr. Martin Luther wrote in the Large Catechism, is "really your God." "If any one boasts," he continued, "of great learning, wisdom, power, prestige, family, and honor, and trusts in them, he also has a god, but not the one, true God." If anyone should claim superiority over others and treat them as inferior because of racial origin or characteristics, we may add, that person, too, has a god, but not the one true God. Racism is at its core idolatry

WHEREAS, racism in the church poisons and cripples all sincere efforts "to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:3). and physical characteristics or cultural customs are made to serve as "a dividing wall of hostility" that separates brothers and sisters in Christ—to which the only appropriate response must be "Is Christ divided?" (1 Cor. 1:13). Racism in the church, in its essence, is a blatant denial of the unity of the body of Christ, into which all who have been baptized into his name have been incorporated: "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:13), and

WHEREAS, Foremost in the list of "the fruit of the Spirit," which is to characterize the life of those who have been set free from the tyranny of their sinful flesh, is love (Gal. 5:22; cf. 5:13-26). The "new commandment" given by Jesus to his disciples is that they love one another as he has loved them, for "by this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35; cf. 1 John 2:8-11; 4:20-5:3; Phil. 2: 4-5)

The law of love cannot be made an excuse for respect of persons. That is to say, keeping one precept of the law does not give one license to disobey the full requirements of the law of love. James says, "If you really fulfill the royal law, according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself,' you do well. But if you show partiality, you commit sin, and are convicted by the law as transgressors" (James 2:8-9), and

WHEREAS, in white nationalist/separatist, alt-right, Evropa Identity, etc the worth of an individual or group as determined principally by genetic origins, biological characteristics, or cultural heritage, race is the primary basis for drawing conclusions about the comparative worth of an individual,

(cf. Ayn Rand, "Any white person who brought the element of civilization had the right to take over this continent", To graduating class of West Point, 1974;

"Our new government is founded upon exactly the opposite ideas; its foundations are laid, its cornerstone rests, upon the great truth that the negro is not equal to the white man; that slavery, subordination to the superior race, is his natural and normal condition. This, our new government, is the first, in the history of the world, based upon this great physical, philosophical, and moral truth.. look with confidence to the ultimate universal acknowledgement of the truths upon which our system rests? It is the first government ever instituted upon the principles in strict conformity to nature, and the ordination of Providence, in furnishing the materials of human society. Many governments have been founded upon the principle of the subordination and serfdom of certain classes of the same race; such were and are in violation of the laws of nature. Our system commits no such violation of nature's laws." Alexander Stevens, Vice President to the Confederacy, "Cornerstone Address" March 21, 1861;

"To be white is to be a striver, a crusader, an explorer and a conqueror. We build, we produce, we go upward ... For us, it is conquer or die. This is a unique burden for the white man, that our fate is entirely in our hands. And it is appropriate because within us, within the very blood in our veins as *Children of the Sun*, lies the potential for greatness. That is the great struggle we are called to. We are not meant to live in shame and weakness and disgrace. We were not meant to beg for moral validation from some of the most despicable creatures to ever populate the planet. We were meant to overcome—overcome all of it. Because that is natural and normal for us. Because for us, as Europeans, it is only normal again when we are great again...the concepts that are now designated "problematic" and associated with whiteness—power, strength, beauty, agency, accomplishment. Whites do and other groups don't ... We don't exploit other groups. We don't gain anything from their presence. They need us, and not the other way around." Richard Spencer, Hail Trump Speech, November 2016)

WHEREAS, Christians of differing national or ethnic origins must not claim Christ as exclusively their own, as if to say that their view of him most closely approximates the biblical portrayal of him.

WHEREAS, the Synod in convention has passed the following resolutions

- 1971 Res. 9-32: To Encourage Christian Action to Combat Racism
- 1973 Res. 9-22: To Continue Efforts to Combat Racism
- 1977 Res 10-18A: To Make Every Effort to Eliminate Racism
- 1979 Res 4-11: To Reaffirm Efforts to Combat Racism
- 1981 Res 8-07: To Oppose Racism and Violence
- 1983 Res 3-09: To Clarify Position on Anti-Semitism
- 1992 Res 3-03: To Combat All Racism
- 1995 Res 2-05A: To Commend for Study the CTCR Document Racism and the Church, and

WHEREAS, As the 1992 resolution states, racism is contrary to God's Word and a sin against Him. Synod by-law 2.3.1 (a) states:

"It shall be the policy of the Synod to decline membership to congregations whose constitutions deny membership or other congregational privileges to any Christian because of race or ethnic origin."

WHEREAS, Racism and white supremacy are present all over the world in various white supremacist movements known as "white nationalism" or "alt-right"; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the New Jersey District of the LCMS, denounce every form of racism, including altright white supremacy, white separatists, British Israelism, Evropa Identity as antithetical to the Gospel of Jesus Christ; and be it further,

RESOLVED, That we denounce and repudiate white supremacy and every form of racial and ethnic hatred as a scheme of the devil intended to bring further suffering and division to the world and to hinder the Gospel; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we earnestly pray, both for those who advocate racist ideologies and those who are thereby deceived, that they may see their error through the light of the Gospel, repent and come to know the peace and love of Christ through redeemed fellowship in the Kingdom of God, which is established from every nation, tribe, people, and language. and be it further

RESOLVED, to reaffirm the resolution the Synod in convention of 1992, "It shall be the policy of the Synod to decline membership to congregations whose constitutions deny membership or other congregational privileges to any Christian because of race or ethnic origin." and be it finally

RESOLVED, that it shall be the policy of the New Jersey District of the LCMS to deny membership any member of Synod who espouses racists ideology as is found in white nationalist/separatists, etc. groups, and to suspend membership any member who refuses to repent of such ideology as it denies the Confessions to which we are to all subscribe.

GREAT COMMISSION INITIATIVE!

Whereas Jesus clearly states His purpose "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost." (Luke 19:10) and whereas with absolute conviction we belief, teach and confess that only trust in the Lord Jesus is the only answer to the question "what must I do to be saved?" (Acts 16:31)

Whereas the Mission Statement of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod reads, "In grateful response to God's grace and empowered by the Holy Spirit through Word and Sacraments, the mission of The LCMS is vigorously to make known the love of Christ by word and deed within our churches, communities and the world."

Whereas Jesus plainly commissioned His disciples to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...." (Matthew 28:19) never telling the world to go to Church but for His church to go to the world. **Whereas** Jesus unmistakably teaches "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (John 14:6)

Whereas St. Peter emphatically confessed "there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." (Acts 4:12)

Whereas St. Paul undeniably taught "All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us." (2 Corinthians 5:18-20)

Whereas we hold firmly to Scriptures teaching, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God!" (Ephesians 2:8) And again, "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift. (Romans 3:23,24)

Whereas it is evidently clear that part of the phenomenal growth of the early Church was the people's amazement, seeing how they loved one another reminding us that we love because we are first loved. (1 John 4:19)

There is no doubt that Satan wants to keep people out of church, and if he can't keep them out, he wants to get them out, and if he can't keep them out or get them out, he will work to render the church ineffective.

Whereas churches are not impacting their communities with the Gospel as shown by a sharp decrease in disciple-making and the spiritual apathy of some who confess that Jesus is both Savior and Lord.

Whereas wide spread Biblical illiteracy has added to the lack of concern for those who do not know Christ.

Whereas 80+% of Congregations in the United States are at best plateau or in a state of decline.

Whereas, according to some recent studies, only 4% of the young people in the United States are presently involved in any religious instruction.

Whereas for today's church, the "Body of Christ" to attract people from todays' society, people within the world's society must begin to see a clear difference between people who confess Christ and those who do not! St Paul urges us "to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called..." (Ephesians 4:1)

Whereas when you "google" "why are Christians so..." among the top ten answers are "critical, judgmental, and unloving."

Whereas we no longer live in a church culture, but in a culture that is hostile towards the church, no longer allowing God in our ln schools, business, and places of public gatherings.

Whereas non-churched people don't have the same appreciation for our creeds, confessions and traditions until they know we really care about them as people and not simply as "numbers" to add to our roles.

Whereas effective and persuasive witness demands the unity of the Church.

Whereas the LCMS and its Congregations firmly confess that we are justified by faith through grace and boldly profess that we are "not ashamed of the gospel for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes…" (Romans 1:16)

Whereas our mission is to love the world God loves, and to welcome "sinners" (Luke 15:2) To love others as Christ does, necessitates that we find way to include people and not erect barriers to keep them out.

Whereas St. Paul "vigorously" teaches that those whom God has called are "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ…" (Ephesians 4:11-16)

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ignoring Christ's command "to go" and to "seek and save the lost" is not acceptable, and that the excuses we use for not sharing Christ's love and sacrifice in our communities is more of the devil and does not witness to how big and great and strong is our God.

BE IT RESOLVED that every Congregation, which God has strategically placed throughout the State of New Jersey, rededicate themselves to join with Jesus in mission as "ambassadors for Christ," finding ways to effectively and courageously engage their respective communities.

BE IT RESOLVED that by the Spirit's guidance each Congregation will intentionally set realistic but challenging goals to impact and engage their communities by first studying and better understanding the demographics of their communities towards the goal of being the best church for their community. (LCEF has an excellent resource, "Mission-in-site)

BE IT RESOLVED that each of our Congregations will hold at least three net fishing events before Ash Wednesday, 2019, mutually sharing their experiences both with churches of their Circuit and District.

BE IT RESOLVED that because we are called to be "the salt of the earth" (Matthew 5:13) and directed to "let our lights shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven," (Matthew 5:16) that we respectfully request all Circuit Visitors to encourage the congregations of their Circuits to be more incarnational and missional, reporting at their respective Circuit meetings the efforts of each Congregation and sharing the results with the Outreach Council of the District.

BE IT RESOLVED that we come to a better understanding of what God is already doing in our communities, reminding ourselves that we "are not on mission for Jesus, but rather with Jesus," knowing that the Head of the Church graciously invites us to join Him in mission, promising to come alongside of us through the power, wisdom and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Outreach Council and other member Congregations of the New Jersey District will aid and support those Congregations that are requesting assistance as to "where to begin?" and "how do we get started?" and "what sources are available?"

BE IT RESOLVED that all congregations of the New Jersey District will use their God given creativity to impact their communities with the love of God, and to adaptively find ways to "Lift high the Cross" in the marketplace.

BE IT RESOLVED that the congregations of the New Jersey District will give prayerful and financial support to our missionaries working within the District in the areas of Church plants, Urban Ministry, and restarts.

AND FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED that the Congregations of the New Jersey commit themselves to hastening the day when "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Philippians 5:10-11)

Sexual Harassment

Whereas, we live in a sexually charged culture; and whereas the notion that humans are sexual creatures with needs and desires is not often addressed by the Church apart from the Sixth Commandment; and whereas the term sexual harassment implies repeated, if not deliberate actions and comments, not just an off-hand remark or an unplanned action, and whereas the rules of engagement, and personal and professional conduct are ill defined, sometimes questioned, but seldom discussed;

Whereas, the news outlets are full of stories of individuals who are said to be victims of sexual abuse, violence, etc... and whereas those Church who volunteer or work in our congregations are not immune from such charges;

Whereas, church workers will from time to time encounter troubled individuals who seek out their consel and advice; and whereas such counsel will happen in private discussions and behind closed doors;

Whereas, church workers themselves may not have the best attitude with regard to this issue, and may in fact be targets for lawsuits;

Whereas, some of our own (clergy and lay people) may have been victimized in the past;

Whereas, it has been quite a few years since the District and her pastors have had training in this area;

And whereas there is a spiritual dimension to sexuality that has not been adequately explored or discussed;

Be it resolved that the New Jersey District congregations direct the District to offer teaching and training on this important issue; that we direct our pastors, pastoral conference(s) and circuits to spend some time discussing at length, not just sexual harassment, but related issues as well.

We ask now that the district and her clergy give attention to the following issues:

What is sexual harassment? Do we all know it when it happens? Are we agreed on what it is and what it isn't? What is the district's responsibility and liability?

Where are the lines of casual banter and conversation among friends, and between coworkers? How do we address one another when it happens?

How is the district (president) supposed to supervise its pastors, workers and congregations in this matter? How do congregations exercise supervision of volunteers and support staff?

How can the District instruct congregations in providing adequate liability coverage?

Be it Resolved that the NJD in order to protect herself, and to set an example for her congregations offer a day-long event (retreat or seminar) on the issue of sexual harassment.

We should seek advice and input from Synod personnel, from the insurance industry, lawyers, police and others who have something intelligent to offer.

Not only should pastors should be **<u>required</u>** to attend, but also retired clergy who may serve vacancies or as pulpit supply to congregations. Deacons, office workers and especially youth workers should also be in attendance.

Be it further resolved that such teaching be offered, if not required, within 18 (eighteen) months of the passage of this resolution, and periodically thereafter.

And be it further resolved that clergy who from time to time enter our district be made aware of polices that come as a result of these events.

To Direct the President of Synod to Assure the Provisions of Bylaw 3.9.2.2 (c) Are Followed

WHEREAS, Overture 2-04 (To Overrule CCM Opinion 14-2724)¹ was not brought forward for debate at the 2016 LCMS National Convention; and

¹ TO OVERRULE CCM OPINION 14-2724

WHEREAS, the Word of God (Acts 13) clearly reveals that in the first century of the New Testament, a local congregation of believers in the Lord Jesus, assembled in Antioch, after much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, freely consecrated and sent missionaries, notably Barnabas and Saul, into mission fields; and

WHEREAS, Article III. 2 of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod identifies an objective of the Synod as to "Strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;" and

WHEREAS, Article VII of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod states, "In relation to its members, the Synod is not an ecclesiastical government exercising legislative or coercive powers, and with respect to the individual congregation's right of self-government it is but an advisory body"; and

WHEREAS, Article XIV of the Constitution states, "The Synod in convention may adopt bylaws that are consistent with and do not contradict the Constitution of the Synod, which controls and supersedes such bylaws and all other rules and regulations of the Synod"; and

WHEREAS, 2010 Synod Convention Res. 8-32B encourages the Synod to study Article VII of the Constitution, including study of "Congregations and Synod, Background Material on the Advisory Nature of the LCMS" along with opinions of the Commission on Constitutional Matters related to this topic (including CCM Opinion 09-2573 listed in a "Whereas" paragraph in Resolution 8-32B); and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-10A in a "Resolved" clause states that The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod reaffirms that its synodical polity is essentially and principally congregational in nature; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 09-2573 states in part that "... there is a common understanding that a congregation exercises its self-government... . in carrying out... its own ministry programs and financial affairs...."; and

WHEREAS, Synod Bylaw 3.8.3 deals only with who has authority to send ministers of religion and other workers into Synod foreign mission fields, and prior bylaws have been careful not to restrict congregational activity specifically relating to whom congregations could send funds overseas, and nothing in the current bylaws restrict or could restrict the right of member congregations to (a) fund ministries in foreign countries, or (b) send/fund congregation members for service with organizations seeking to share the Gospel; and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-37 amending the bylaws only dealt with who on behalf of Synod as a whole could send missionaries at the expense of the Synod, and where the restriction applied, it being a sending bylaw only, clearly not applicable to congregations in any event; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 referring to 2013 Synod Convention Res. 1-08, "To Work Together in Mission," called for a two-fold response: First, "Resolved, That the Synod, by the next convention, develop and provide a mission best practices policy document for districts and congregations engaged in mission projects to assist them to better carry out their mission and their life together", indicating that districts and congregations have and are recognized to have mission work and practices of their own, and because they have their own mission work and practices, the Synod should assist and support those efforts by developing a best-practices policy; and second, "that these best practices include encouragement to districts and congregations to communicate their international mission activities to the Synod's Director of Church Relations and Offices of National and International Mission for the purposes of healthy coordination and stewardship" (underlined portions indicate emphasis added), indicating that districts and congregations can have their own mission activities and when they do they are encouraged to communicate these activities to the Synod for coordination and good stewardship; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 states in part, "Congregations may not send funds to mission societies and non-Synod entities for work in foreign areas without taking into consideration policies developed and determined for this purpose by the Board of International Mission as the only sending agency;" and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 incorrectly restricts the mission outreach of congregations and others to give bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world; therefore be it

Resolved, That the congregations of the Texas District and of The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod be encouraged, with much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to send missionaries to foreign areas; and be it further WHEREAS, Overture 2-04 was submitted by four LCMS districts, three district boards of directors, one circuit, and seventeen LCMS congregations; and

WHEREAS, Two other overtures (2-07, 2-09) were submitted to the 2016 LCMS Convention that also requested that CCM Opinion 14-2724 also be overruled; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 3.9.2.2 (c) regarding the CCM says, in part: "An opinion rendered by the commission shall be binding on the question decided unless and until it is overruled by a convention of the Synod. Overtures to a convention that seek to overrule an opinion of the commission shall support the proposed action with substantive rationale from the Constitution, Bylaws, and resolutions of the Synod. All such overtures shall be considered by the floor committee to which they have been assigned and shall be included in a specific report to the convention with recommendations for appropriate action;" and

WHEREAS, No such report was given to the 2016 convention of the Synod; and

WHEREAS, No disposition of these overtures whatsoever is recorded in the 2016 Synod convention Proceedings; therefore be it

Resolved, That Overture 2-04 as found in the LCMS 2016 National Convention Workbook be submitted as an overture to the 2019 Synod convention by the adoption of this, current resolution; and be it further

Resolved, That the President of Synod be directed to assure that the provisions of Bylaw 3.9.2.2(c) are followed with respect to this resolution and any other resolution that becomes an overture to the Synod asking for a CCM opinion to be overruled; and be it finally

Resolved, That also in our agreements in how we will work together in the LCMS, things "be done in a fitting and orderly way" (I Corinthians 14:40).

Resolved, That the Texas District affirms and encourages congregations, auxiliaries, recognized service organizations, districts, and individual members of the Synod, in their efforts to give bold witness by word and deed, to the love and work of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness to all the world; and be it further

NJ DISTRICT 2018 CONVENTION OVERTURES

Overture 1 To Ensure Timely and Transparent Financial Reporting in the Synod

WHEREAS, A principle of Biblical stewardship is to be accountable with the resources with which one has been entrusted, as expressed in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14 ff.); and

WHEREAS, Much is required of those to whom God has entrusted his gifts. As Jesus said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b, ESV); and

WHEREAS, The Scriptures teach "it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2, ESV); and

WHEREAS, The Synod has historically recognized its responsibility of accountability and faithfulness in the handling of the finances entrusted to it by its members, as is witnessed in Bylaw 1.5.4, "The Synod and each of its agencies shall fully disclose their financial books and records to any member congregation of the Synod;" and

WHEREAS, The Synod in previous conventions has expressed its opinion that such accountability and faithfulness be found additionally in regular reporting of such financial disclosure by adopting 2010 Convention Resolution 4-03, "To Broadly Communicate the Statement of Financial Position of LCMS," which reads in its totality:

"WHEREAS, It is helpful to understand the Synod's financial position and communicate it to the members of the congregations of Synod; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That each November, the Vice-President–Finance—Treasurer of the Synod use widely available means, (i.e., The Lutheran Witness, Reporter, the LCMS Website) to state the financial position of the Synod in a format easily understood by persons unfamiliar with financial terminology." (2010 Convention Proceedings, p. 120); and

WHEREAS, The members of the Synod expressed even further the need for full transparency in all areas of financial disclosure by adopting 2016 convention RESOLUTION 9-04A, "To Improve Disclosures Related to Financial Gifts from God's Stewards for Special Appeals," which stated in part,

"...WHEREAS, Monies for special appeals requested by corporate Synod (e.g., following natural disasters) are reported only in part in Synod publications (e.g., Reporter and The Lutheran Witness) and sometimes only annually; and ...

WHEREAS, Donors and members of the Synod are interested in the impact of funds raised for special appeals and will appreciate improved disclosure of results; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the financial offices of corporate Synod continue to recognize the desire of donors and members of the Synod to improve processes of reporting and work to provide clear, timely, and transparent accounting for all funding and special appeals, so that the Body of Christ

may experience the joy of Gospel-centered mission and ministry beyond the local context or community." (2016 Convention Proceedings, p. 189); and

WHEREAS, It was reported to the 2013 Convention of the Synod by the Board of Directors in its Report on the Disposition of Funding the Mission Recommendations (R6-03-01) that "the decline in the Synod's annual unrestricted revenue continues...The board believes that congregations will respond through better, open, and honest communication about the great things God is able to accomplish for His kingdom when we work together. Numerous conventions have passed resolutions calling on congregations to maintain and increase unrestricted support for district and Synod ministries, yet the unrestricted support passed through our districts to the Synod has continued to decline at the average rate of \$1 million each year." (2013 Convention Workbook 2013, p. 114-115); and

WHEREAS, In 2016, the Chief Financial Officer of the Synod, in reporting to the Synod about offerings received, stated, "This sharing from God's bounty continues to decline. Although the amount of decline in the past three years has not been as severe as the average decline of the previous 20 years, it is still trending negatively. In the face of continued declining unrestricted revenues, the ability of Synod, Inc. to respond quickly and nimbly to mission and ministry opportunities and challenges laid before us by our Lord also declines, as does our ability to "fill in the gap" when restricted revenues, needed to fund much of our mission and ministry activities, fall short of their goals. The financial challenges facing our beloved Synod persist. I believe that these challenges are of our own making, a product of how we distribute the resources provided by our loving Father." (2016 Convention Workbook, pp. 61-62); and

WHEREAS, There have been few tangible reports about the financial struggles of the Synod, such as the need to trim \$4 million dollars from the budget of the Synod (ref. July 7, 2017 Reporter, https://blogs.lcms.org/2017/international-national-mission and the May 19-20, 2017 Synod Board of Directors Minutes https://www.lcms.org/Document.fdoc?src=lcm&id=4769), these reports are less than sufficient to keep the members of the Synod regularly informed about the financial condition of the Synod; and

WHEREAS, It has been widely reported, albeit not in the official channels of the Synod communications, that the Synod has only minimal days of operating capital in its cash reserves, which would seemingly place the synod in a precarious financial position (ref. Paragraph 45, Financial Reports of the February 17-18, 2017 LCMS Board of Directors Minutes

https://www.lcms.org/Document.fdoc?src=lcm&id=4659), which stated that without funds held on behalf of the two Seminaries, Synod had only a 5 days of cash available); and

WHEREAS, In the face of such challenging financial times, transparency and regularity in reporting of the financial situation of the Synod is of upmost importance to the members and constituency of the Synod who have a vested interest in the financial viability of the Synod and who merit clear, concise, and timely reports; and

WHEREAS, The president of the synod recommended in his report to the Synod in 2016 that the synod have "Uniform Financial Reporting." (2016 Today's Business, p. 28); therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Synod in convention direct the Chief Financial Officer to report quarterly in the Synod's official publications about the financial position of the Synod in a format easily understood by persons unfamiliar with financial terminology, such reporting to include, but not limited to income and expenses, budget versus spending, cash reserves and cash position, etc.; and be it further

RESOLVED, That these quarterly reports include information about the regular Synod budget and the reporting on special appeals as stipulated in 2016 Resolution 9-04A; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Synod be shrewd managers with the resources God has given it; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the Synod give thanks to God for the resources He has entrusted to us, recognizing "That the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof" (Psalm 24:1, ESV).

Whereas the Texas District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, at its 2015 convention, adopted the following resolution: RESOLUTION: 02-01-15A RE: OVERTURES 02-04-15, 02-05-15, 02-06-15, 02-07-15, 02-08-15, 02-09-15, 02-10-15, 02-11-15, 02-12-15, 02-13-15 SUBJECT: TO OVERRULE CCM OPINION 14-2724

WHEREAS, the Word of God (Acts 13) clearly reveals that in the first century of the New Testament, a local congregation of believers in the Lord Jesus, assembled in Antioch, after much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, freely consecrated and sent missionaries, notably Barnabas and Saul, into mission fields; and

WHEREAS, Article III. 2 of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod identifies an objective of the Synod as to "Strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;" and

WHEREAS, Article VII of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod states, "In relation to its members, the Synod is not an ecclesiastical government exercising legislative or coercive powers, and with respect to the individual congregation's right of self-government it is but an advisory body"; and

WHEREAS, Article XIV of the Constitution states, "The Synod in convention may adopt bylaws that are consistent with and do not contradict the Constitution of the Synod, which controls and supersedes such bylaws and all other rules and regulations of the Synod"; and

WHEREAS, 2010 Synod Convention Res. 8-32B encourages the Synod to study Article VII of the Constitution, including study of "Congregations and Synod, Background Material on the Advisory Nature of the LCMS" along with opinions of the Commission on Constitutional Matters related to this topic (including CCM Opinion 09-2573 listed in a "Whereas" paragraph in Resolution 8-32B); and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-10A in a "Resolved" clause states that The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod reaffirms that its synodical polity is essentially and principally congregational in nature; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 09-2573 states in part that "... there is a common understanding that a congregation exercises its self-government ... in carrying out ... its own ministry programs and financial affairs ..."; and

WHEREAS, Synod Bylaw 3.8.3 deals only with who has authority to send ministers of religion and other workers into Synod foreign mission fields, and prior bylaws have been careful not to restrict congregational activity specifically relating to whom congregations could send funds overseas, and nothing in the current bylaws restrict or could restrict the right of member congregations to (a) fund ministries in foreign countries, or (b) send/fund congregation members for service with organizations seeking to share the Gospel; and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-37 amending the bylaws only dealt with who on behalf of Synod as a whole could send missionaries at the expense of the Synod, and where the restriction applied, it being a sending bylaw only, clearly not applicable to congregations in any event; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 referring to 2013 Synod Convention Res. 1-08, "To Work Together in Mission," called for a two-fold response: First, "Resolved, That the Synod, by the next convention, develop and provide a mission best practices policy document for districts and congregations engaged in mission projects to assist them to better carry out their mission and their life together", indicating that districts and congregations have and are recognized to have mission work and practices of their own, and because they have their own mission work and practices, the Synod should assist and support those efforts by developing a best-practices policy; and second, "that these best practices include encouragement to districts and congregations to communicate their international mission activities to the Synod's Director of

Church Relations and Offices of National and International Mission for the purposes of healthy coordination and stewardship" (underlined portions indicate emphasis added), indicating that districts and congregations can have their own mission activities and when they do they are encouraged to communicate these activities to the Synod for coordination and good stewardship; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 states in part, "Congregations may not send funds to mission societies and non-Synod entities for work in foreign areas without taking into consideration policies developed and determined for this purpose by the Board of International Mission as the only sending agency;" and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 incorrectly restricts the mission outreach of congregations and others to give bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the congregations of the Texas District and of The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod be encouraged, with much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to send missionaries to foreign areas; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Texas District affirms and encourages congregations, auxiliaries, recognized service organizations, districts, and individual members of the Synod, in their efforts to give bold witness by word and deed, to the love and work of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness to all the world; and be it further

RESOLVED, That nothing in the bylaws of Synod should ever be interpreted to limit efforts by congregations, auxiliaries, recognized service organizations, districts, and individual members of the Synod, to give bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness to all the world, but only be interpreted as requesting information which might allow Synod to support (and to assist in connecting potential support for) congregations and individual members, to assist in connecting potential mission partners, and to provide best practices information which could assist the efforts; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the Texas District in convention memorialize the Synod in convention to adopt this resolution and to overrule CCM Opinion 14-2724, to be thereby declared null and void and of no effect. Rev. Larry Krueger, Chairman Rev. Brian Hesse, Secretary

WHEREAS, The above resolution appears in the 2016 LCMS Convention Workbook as Overture 2-04; and

WHEREAS, Three other LCMS districts, three district boards of directors, one circuit, and seventeen LCMS congregations also adopted this resolution; and

WHEREAS, Two other overtures (2-07, 2-09) were submitted to the 2016 LCMS Convention that also requested that CCM Opinion 14-2724 also be overruled; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 3.9.2.2 (c) regarding the CCM says, in part:

An opinion rendered by the commission shall be binding on the question decided unless and until it is overruled by a convention of the Synod. Overtures to a convention that seek to overrule an opinion of the commission shall support the proposed action with substantive rationale from the Constitution, Bylaws, and resolutions of the Synod. All such overtures shall be considered by the floor committee to which they have been assigned and shall be included in a specific report to the convention with recommendations for appropriate action.

(Emphasis added)

And

WHEREAS, No such report was given to the 2016 convention of the Synod; and

WHEREAS, No disposition of these overtures whatsoever is recorded in the 2016 Synod convention Proceedings; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the resolution quoted above be submitted as an overture to the 2019 Synod convention by the adoption of this, current resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the President of Synod be directed to assure that the provisions of Bylaw 3.9.2.2 (c) are followed with respect to this resolution and any other resolution that becomes an overture to the Synod asking for a CCM opinion to be overruled; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That also in our agreements in how we will work together in the LCMS, things "be done in a fitting and orderly way" (I Corinthians 14:40).

OVERTURE 3

To Overrule Board of Directors' May 2017 Resolution 12-14, re Bylaw 7.1.2

WHEREAS, The 2016 Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, in its Resolution 12-14 ["Regarding the Right of an Accuser to Appeal When a District President or President of the Synod Fails to Act or Declines to Suspend"] and according to Bylaw 7.1.2, deferred its rightful and legislative authority regarding the development of ecclesiastical supervision bylaws with respect to and inclusion of the President of the Synod, the decision given to Synod's Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 12-14, in accordance with Bylaw 7.1.2, set forth a specific path and timeline for consideration, negotiation and counsel to be conducted with the Council of Presidents, with any proposed amendments to the bylaws to be reviewed by the Commission on Constitutional Matters and the Commission on Handbook; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 12-14 states that the Commission on Constitutional Matters in Op. 16-2791 "has indicated portions of the expulsion processes of Synod's Bylaws are presently in an unconstitutional state with respect to Const. Art. XI B 1–3 and Const. Art. XIII 2"; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Directors, acting under Bylaw 7.1.2 and at the express direction of the 2016 Resolution 12-14, in May of 2017 adopted changes to the bylaws of the Synod regarding ecclesiastical supervision; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution of Synod defines clearly, precisely, and fully the supervisory role of the President of Synod, wherein the President of Synod has "the supervision regarding the doctrine and the administration of a. All officers of the Synod; b. All such as are employed by the Synod; c. The individual district of the Synod; d. All district presidents" (XI.B.1); and

WHEREAS, The President of Synod, as ecclesiastical supervisor, is limited in the exercise of said power, assuming "only such rights as have been expressly conferred" (XI A.1) ["The officers of the Synod must assume only such rights as have been expressly conferred upon them by the Synod, and in everything pertaining to their rights and the performance of their duties, they are responsible to the Synod."], which are expressly conferred to be "the power to advise, admonish, and reprove…conscientiously use all means at his command to promote and maintain unity of doctrine and practice in all the districts of the Synod" (XI.B.3); and

WHEREAS, Synod's Constitution expressly confers upon the District Presidents the duty to "*exercise supervision over*" their district's ministers and to "*visit and…hold investigations in the congregations*" (*XII.7*), including the District Presidents being empowered "*to suspend from membership*" their district's ministers (XII.8); and

WHEREAS, Prior to the year 2016 and CCM Op. 16-2791, numerous CCM opinions [to wit Ag. 1970, Op.15-2750, 13-2669, 10-2581, 03-2354, and 03-2338, A and C] interpreted the President of Synod's scope of ecclesiastical supervision do not include supervision over individual workers and congregations expressed in Article XII.7,8; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That Synod in convention, as the ultimate legislative body of Synod [Bylaw 1.4.1: "The delegate convention of the Synod is the legislative assembly that ultimately legislates policy, program, and financial direction to carry on the Synod's work on behalf of and in support of the member

congregations. It reserves to itself the right to give direction to all officers and agencies of the Synod. Consequently, all officers and agencies, unless otherwise specified in the Bylaws, shall be accountable to the Synod for all their actions, and any concerns regarding the decisions of such officers or agencies may be brought to the attention of the Synod in convention for appropriate action. This provision does not apply to specific member appeals to the Concordia Plans, which has its own appeal process for such cases. "] considers the following to be steps to the resolution of this matter; and be it further

RESOLVED, That changes, subsequent to 2016 Convention Resolution 12-14, made under Bylaw 2.14 "Expulsion of Congregations or Individuals from Membership in the Synod," under Bylaw 2.15 "Expulsion of a District President or Officer from Membership in the Synod", under Bylaw 2.16 "Expulsion of a President of Synod from Membership in the Synod", and under Bylaw 2.17 "Expulsion of Individuals from Membership in the Synod as a Result of Sexual Misconduct or Criminal Behavior", as a result of 2016 Convention Resolution 12-14, as adopted by the Board of Directors (May 2017) be overruled and of no effect; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Bylaws 2.14, 2.15, 2.16 and 2.17 be returned to and replaced by the same corresponding Bylaws as set forth in the 2013 Synod Handbook; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a Blue Ribbon Task Force of seven members, with four members appointed by the 35 District Presidents, three of whom shall be District Presidents, and three members appointed by the President of Synod, be authorized and formed to conduct a thorough study of the ecclesiastical supervision matter, including Articles III, VI, VII (studies of Articles VI and VII were previously resolved by the 2010 Convention), XI, XII, and XIII, and make recommendations to the 2022 Synod Convention, including any necessary revisions of constitutional provisions, with the purpose of evangelically resolving the current difficulty and division among us; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all relevant CCM opinions such as 16-2791, 16-2793, 16-2794, 16-2797, 17-2822, 17-2828 and 17-2836 be placed in abeyance until the 2022 Convention and any necessary action at the 2022 convention; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Synod in convention affirm the powers provided to the Synod President "to advise, admonish and reprove...conscientiously use all means at his command to promote and maintain unity of doctrine and practice in all the districts of the Synod" do not include direct supervisory responsibilities of individual members of Synod, since such individuals are under the ecclesiastical supervision of District Presidents; and be it finally

RESOLVED, That the convention pray for peace and harmony in the Synod as it moves forward in mission and ministry.

Resolved, that the NJ District help congregations in developing creative ways to manage the resource of land and facilities, including the sale of said properties so that the current congregation could continue and thrive in a new way.

To Adopt Data Privacy Best Practices

WHEREAS, The District and Synod collect personal identity and contact information from convention delegates and from those who vote for President of Synod; and

WHEREAS, Best practices for data privacy include the safeguarding of such personal information, its use only in the official conduct of business, and strict limitations on its disclosure; and

WHEREAS, Our delegates in convention take positions at odds with the culture, making disclosure of their personal information a security concern. For example, the Family Research Council in DC and donors to California Prop 8 were attacked professionally and personally for the same positions on marriage that our delegates enacted in 2016 14-02A, 14-03A, and 14-04; and

WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 3.12.2.3 now prohibits non-official use or distribution of the list of congregation-selected voters for President of Synod; and

WHEREAS, The Synod openly publishes the street addresses of national delegates as part of the Convention Workbook, which is posted on the Internet and easily downloaded; and

WHEREAS, The Secretary of Synod's office sells copies of this list to interested parties, which use them mainly for political ends. In 2016, some of those distributions disclosed national delegate e-mail addresses without consent; and

WHEREAS, LCMS districts have used their access to voters lists to send advocacy-type mailings and emails directly to those who vote for synod officials; therefore be it

Resolved, That the New Jersey District affirms its commitment to data privacy best practices, including protection of identity and contact information for its district convention delegates, and the use or distribution of that information only for official business and with consent of the persons involved; and be it further

Resolved, That the New Jersey District adopts a practice, consistent with LCMS Bylaw 3.12.2.3, which prohibits its use of private voter contact information in connection with synod-level elections; and be it further

Resolved, That the New Jersey District memorialize the Synod in convention to adopt practices that stop the public disclosure of delegate street addresses and require prior consent for any distribution of their personal contact information.

Overture 7 To Engage in Ministry to Transgendered Persons

WHEREAS, All persons are created in God's image and are made to glorify Him (Genesis 1:27; Isaiah 43:7); and

WHEREAS, God's design was the creation of two distinct and complementary sexes, male and female (Genesis 1:27; Matthew 19:4; Mark 10:6;) which designate the fundamental distinction that God has embedded in the very biology of the human race; and

WHEREAS, Distinctions in masculine and feminine as ordained by God are part of the created order and should find expression in every human heart (Genesis 2:18, 21–24; 1 Corinthians 11:7–9; Ephesians 5:22–33; 1 Timothy 2:12–14); and

WHEREAS, The Fall of man into sin and God's subsequent curse have introduced brokenness and futility into God's good creation (Genesis 3:1–24; Romans 8:20); and

WHEREAS, According to a 2016 study from the UCLA School of Law, about 1.4 million Americans identify as transgender; and

WHEREAS, Transgenderism differs from hermaphroditism or intersexualism in that the sex of the individual is not biologically ambiguous but psychologically ambiguous; and

WHEREAS, The state of New Jersey prohibits licensed counselors from any attempt to change a child's "gender expression"; and

WHEREAS, the church does not have a good history at ministering to transgendered persons often due to our uncomfortablity with the topic or harsh, unloving, hypocritical manner in which we speak to them often while refusing to speak publicly against other sexual sins such as divorce, remarriage, pornography, sexual harassment, coarse language, etc, and

WHEREAS, the CTCR has produced a 2014 paper entitled, "Gender Identity Disorder or Gender Dysphoria in Christian Perspective" which begins to address this topic; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the NJ District in convention affirm God's good design that gender identity is determined by biological sex and not by one's self-perception—a perception which is often influenced by fallen human nature in ways contrary to God's design (Ephesians 4:17–18); and be it further

RESOLVED, that we commend the CTCR for their current work and request they produce a full study on practical ministry to transgendered persons, and be it

RESOLVED, That we grieve the reality of human fallenness which can result in such biological manifestations as intersexuality or psychological manifestations as gender identity confusion and point all to the hope of the redemption of our bodies in Christ (Romans 8:23); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we extend love and compassion to those whose sexual self-understanding is shaped by a distressing conflict between their biological sex and their gender identity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we invite all transgender persons to trust in Christ and to experience renewal in the Gospel (1 Timothy 1:15–16); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we love our transgender neighbors, seek their good always, welcome them to our churches and, as they repent and believe in Christ, receive them into church membership (2 Corinthians 5:18–20; Galatians 5:14); and be it further

RESOLVED, That we regard our transgender neighbors as image-bearers of God and therefore condemn acts of abuse or bullying committed against them; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we oppose efforts to alter one's bodily identity (e.g., cross-sex hormone therapy, gender reassignment surgery) to refashion it to conform with one's perceived gender identity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we continue to oppose steadfastly all efforts by any governing official or body to validate transgender identity as morally praiseworthy (Isaiah 5:20); and be it further

RESOLVED, That our love for the Gospel and urgency for the Great Commission must include declaring the whole counsel of God, proclaiming what Scripture teaches about God's design for us as male and female persons created in His image and for His glory (Matthew 28:19–20; Acts 20:27; Romans 11:36).

Overture 8 To Combat Racism within the Church and Society

WHEREAS, Scripture teaches, "God made from one man every nation of mankind to live on all the face of the earth," (Acts 17:26); and

WHEREAS, All people are created in the same image of God, no matter what human distinguishing identifiers might be (Gen. 1:26-27; 9:6; cf. Acts 17:25, 26) and

WHEREAS, central to the doctrine of creation is the truth of the equal value of all humans grounded in the unsurpassable worth that God places in them, demonstrated by the unsurpassable price he paid for each individual person, and

WHEREAS, In Jesus, God became a human and so identifies fully with every human (Hebrews 2:17), not only Israel but all of humanity and that his mission embraces all of humankind (Matt. 1:1-17; Luke 3:23-38), and

WHEREAS, Any claim that there is something about the nature of another human being as such that renders that person to be of inferior value not only denies the biblical doctrine of creation, but also calls into question what the Scriptures teach about the incarnation of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As a human, Jesus descended from Adam, whom God created (Luke 3:38), and whom all human beings have as progenitor. To deny the full humanity of any fellow human being is at the same time to compromise the apostolic truth that in Christ "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" (Col. 2:9), that is, that he truly "was made man" (Nicene Creed).

WHEREAS, Jesus Christ has removed all barriers between all human beings, making peace through His cross (Eph. 2:13-16), and

WHEREAS, The Apostle Peter said, "God doesn't show favoritism, but in every nation the person who fears Him and does what is right is acceptable to Him" (Acts 10:34–35); and

WHEREAS, The Book of Concord teaches that all Christians will make the will of Christ supreme in their own lives and in human society, and so opposing all forms of racism (AC Ap V 1-3,)

WHEREAS, ""That to which your heart clings and entrusts itself," Dr. Martin Luther wrote in the Large Catechism, is "really your God." "If any one boasts," he continued, "of great learning, wisdom, power, prestige, family, and honor, and trusts in them, he also has a god, but not the one, true God." If anyone should claim superiority over others and treat them as inferior because of racial origin or characteristics, we may add, that person, too, has a god, but not the one true God. Racism is at its core idolatry

WHEREAS, racism in the church poisons and cripples all sincere efforts "to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:3). and physical characteristics or cultural customs are made to serve as "a dividing wall of hostility" that separates brothers and sisters in Christ—to which the only appropriate response must be "Is Christ divided?" (1 Cor. 1:13). Racism in the church, in its essence, is a blatant denial of the unity of the body of Christ, into which all who have been baptized into his name have been incorporated: "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:13), and

WHEREAS, Foremost in the list of "the fruit of the Spirit," which is to characterize the life of those who have been set free from the tyranny of their sinful flesh, is love (Gal. 5:22; cf. 5:13-26). The "new commandment" given by Jesus to his disciples is that they love one another as he has loved them, for "by this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35; cf. 1 John 2:8-11; 4:20-5:3; Phil. 2: 4-5)

The law of love cannot be made an excuse for respect of persons. That is to say, keeping one precept of the law does not give one license to disobey the full requirements of the law of love. James says, "If you really fulfill the royal law, according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself,' you do well. But if you show partiality, you commit sin, and are convicted by the law as transgressors" (James 2:8-9), and

WHEREAS, in white nationalist/separatist, alt-right, Evropa Identity, etc the worth of an individual or group as determined principally by genetic origins, biological characteristics, or cultural heritage, race is the primary basis for drawing conclusions about the comparative worth of an individual,

(cf. Ayn Rand, "Any white person who brought the element of civilization had the right to take over this continent", To graduating class of West Point, 1974;

"Our new government is founded upon exactly the opposite ideas; its foundations are laid, its cornerstone rests, upon the great truth that the negro is not equal to the white man; that slavery, subordination to the superior race, is his natural and normal condition. This, our new government, is the first, in the history of the world, based upon this great physical, philosophical, and moral truth.. look with confidence to the ultimate universal acknowledgement of the truths upon which our system rests? It is the first government ever instituted upon the principles in strict conformity to nature, and the ordination of Providence, in furnishing the materials of human society. Many governments have been founded upon the principle of the subordination and serfdom of certain classes of the same race; such were and are in violation of the laws of nature. Our system commits no such violation of nature's laws." Alexander Stevens, Vice President to the Confederacy, "Cornerstone Address" March 21, 1861;

"To be white is to be a striver, a crusader, an explorer and a conqueror. We build, we produce, we go upward ... For us, it is conquer or die. This is a unique burden for the white man, that our fate is entirely in our hands. And it is appropriate because within us, within the very blood in our veins as *Children of the Sun*, lies the potential for greatness. That is the great struggle we are called to. We are not meant to live in shame and weakness and disgrace. We were not meant to beg for moral validation from some of the most despicable creatures to ever populate the planet. We were meant to overcome—overcome all of it. Because that is natural and normal for us. Because for us, as Europeans, it is only normal again when we are great again...the concepts that are now designated "problematic" and associated with whiteness—power, strength, beauty, agency, accomplishment. Whites do and other groups don't ... We don't exploit other groups. We don't gain anything from their presence. They need us, and not the other way around." Richard Spencer, Hail Trump Speech, November 2016)

WHEREAS, Christians of differing national or ethnic origins must not claim Christ as exclusively their own, as if to say that their view of him most closely approximates the biblical portrayal of him.

WHEREAS, the Synod in convention has passed the following resolutions

- 1971 Res. 9-32: To Encourage Christian Action to Combat Racism
- 1973 Res. 9-22: To Continue Efforts to Combat Racism
- 1977 Res 10-18A: To Make Every Effort to Eliminate Racism
- 1979 Res 4-11: To Reaffirm Efforts to Combat Racism
- 1981 Res 8-07: To Oppose Racism and Violence
- 1983 Res 3-09: To Clarify Position on Anti-Semitism
- 1992 Res 3-03: To Combat All Racism
- 1995 Res 2-05A: To Commend for Study the CTCR Document Racism and the Church, and

WHEREAS, As the 1992 resolution states, racism is contrary to God's Word and a sin against Him. Synod by-law 2.3.1 (a) states:

"It shall be the policy of the Synod to decline membership to congregations whose constitutions deny membership or other congregational privileges to any Christian because of race or ethnic origin."

WHEREAS, Racism and white supremacy are present all over the world in various white supremacist movements known as "white nationalism" or "alt-right"; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the New Jersey District of the LCMS, denounce every form of racism, including altright white supremacy, white separatists, British Israelism, Evropa Identity as antithetical to the Gospel of Jesus Christ; and be it further,

RESOLVED, That we denounce and repudiate white supremacy and every form of racial and ethnic hatred as a scheme of the devil intended to bring further suffering and division to the world and to hinder the Gospel; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we earnestly pray, both for those who advocate racist ideologies and those who are thereby deceived, that they may see their error through the light of the Gospel, repent and come to know the peace and love of Christ through redeemed fellowship in the Kingdom of God, which is established from every nation, tribe, people, and language. and be it further

RESOLVED, to reaffirm the resolution the Synod in convention of 1992, "It shall be the policy of the Synod to decline membership to congregations whose constitutions deny membership or other congregational privileges to any Christian because of race or ethnic origin." and be it finally

RESOLVED, that it shall be the policy of the New Jersey District of the LCMS to deny membership any member of Synod who espouses racists ideology as is found in white nationalist/separatists, etc. groups, and to suspend membership any member who refuses to repent of such ideology as it denies the Confessions to which we are to all subscribe.

GREAT COMMISSION INITIATIVE!

Whereas Jesus clearly states His purpose "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost." (Luke 19:10) and whereas with absolute conviction we belief, teach and confess that only trust in the Lord Jesus is the only answer to the question "what must I do to be saved?" (Acts 16:31)

Whereas the Mission Statement of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod reads, "In grateful response to God's grace and empowered by the Holy Spirit through Word and Sacraments, the mission of The LCMS is vigorously to make known the love of Christ by word and deed within our churches, communities and the world."

Whereas Jesus plainly commissioned His disciples to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...." (Matthew 28:19) never telling the world to go to Church but for His church to go to the world. **Whereas** Jesus unmistakably teaches "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (John 14:6)

Whereas St. Peter emphatically confessed "there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." (Acts 4:12)

Whereas St. Paul undeniably taught "All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us." (2 Corinthians 5:18-20)

Whereas we hold firmly to Scriptures teaching, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God!" (Ephesians 2:8) And again, "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift. (Romans 3:23,24)

Whereas it is evidently clear that part of the phenomenal growth of the early Church was the people's amazement, seeing how they loved one another reminding us that we love because we are first loved. (1 John 4:19)

Whereas St Paul warns us that "we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly place, (Ephesians 6:12). There is no doubt that Satan wants to keep people out of church, and if he can't keep them out, he wants to get them out, and if he can't keep them out or get them out, he will work to render the church ineffective.

Whereas churches are not impacting their communities with the Gospel as shown by a sharp decrease in disciple-making and the spiritual apathy of some who confess that Jesus is both Savior and Lord.

Whereas wide spread Biblical illiteracy has added to the lack of concern for those who do not know Christ.

Whereas 80+% of Congregations in the United States are at best plateau or in a state of decline.

Whereas, according to some recent studies, only 4% of the young people in the United States are presently involved in any religious instruction.

Whereas for today's church, the "Body of Christ" to attract people from todays' society, people within the world's society must begin to see a clear difference between people who confess Christ and those who do not! St Paul urges us "to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called..." (Ephesians 4:1)

Whereas when you "google" "why are Christians so..." among the top ten answers are "critical, judgmental, and unloving."

Whereas we no longer live in a church culture, but in a culture that is hostile towards the church, no longer allowing God in our ln schools, business, and places of public gatherings.

Whereas non-churched people don't have the same appreciation for our creeds, confessions and traditions until they know we really care about them as people and not simply as "numbers" to add to our roles.

Whereas effective and persuasive witness demands the unity of the Church.

Whereas the LCMS and its Congregations firmly confess that we are justified by faith through grace and boldly profess that we are "not ashamed of the gospel for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes…" (Romans 1:16)

Whereas our mission is to love the world God loves, and to welcome "sinners" (Luke 15:2) To love others as Christ does, necessitates that we find way to include people and not erect barriers to keep them out.

Whereas St. Paul "vigorously" teaches that those whom God has called are "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ…" (Ephesians 4:11-16)

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that ignoring Christ's command "to go" and to "seek and save the lost" is not acceptable, and that the excuses we use for not sharing Christ's love and sacrifice in our communities is more of the devil and does not witness to how big and great and strong is our God.

BE IT RESOLVED that every Congregation, which God has strategically placed throughout the State of New Jersey, rededicate themselves to join with Jesus in mission as "ambassadors for Christ," finding ways to effectively and courageously engage their respective communities.

BE IT RESOLVED that by the Spirit's guidance each Congregation will intentionally set realistic but challenging goals to impact and engage their communities by first studying and better understanding the demographics of their communities towards the goal of being the best church for their community. (LCEF has an excellent resource, "Mission-in-site)

BE IT RESOLVED that each of our Congregations will hold at least three net fishing events before Ash Wednesday, 2019, mutually sharing their experiences both with churches of their Circuit and District.

BE IT RESOLVED that because we are called to be "the salt of the earth" (Matthew 5:13) and directed to "let our lights shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven," (Matthew 5:16) that we respectfully request all Circuit Visitors to encourage the congregations of their Circuits to be more incarnational and missional, reporting at their respective Circuit meetings the efforts of each Congregation and sharing the results with the Outreach Council of the District.

BE IT RESOLVED that we come to a better understanding of what God is already doing in our communities, reminding ourselves that we "are not on mission for Jesus, but rather with Jesus," knowing that the Head of the Church graciously invites us to join Him in mission, promising to come alongside of us through the power, wisdom and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Outreach Council and other member Congregations of the New Jersey District will aid and support those Congregations that are requesting assistance as to "where to begin?" and "how do we get started?" and "what sources are available?"

BE IT RESOLVED that all congregations of the New Jersey District will use their God given creativity to impact their communities with the love of God, and to adaptively find ways to "Lift high the Cross" in the marketplace.

BE IT RESOLVED that the congregations of the New Jersey District will give prayerful and financial support to our missionaries working within the District in the areas of Church plants, Urban Ministry, and restarts.

AND FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED that the Congregations of the New Jersey commit themselves to hastening the day when "at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Philippians 5:10-11)

Sexual Harassment

Whereas, we live in a sexually charged culture; and whereas the notion that humans are sexual creatures with needs and desires is not often addressed by the Church apart from the Sixth Commandment; and whereas the term sexual harassment implies repeated, if not deliberate actions and comments, not just an off-hand remark or an unplanned action, and whereas the rules of engagement, and personal and professional conduct are ill defined, sometimes questioned, but seldom discussed;

Whereas, the news outlets are full of stories of individuals who are said to be victims of sexual abuse, violence, etc... and whereas those Church who volunteer or work in our congregations are not immune from such charges;

Whereas, church workers will from time to time encounter troubled individuals who seek out their consel and advice; and whereas such counsel will happen in private discussions and behind closed doors;

Whereas, church workers themselves may not have the best attitude with regard to this issue, and may in fact be targets for lawsuits;

Whereas, some of our own (clergy and lay people) may have been victimized in the past;

Whereas, it has been quite a few years since the District and her pastors have had training in this area;

And whereas there is a spiritual dimension to sexuality that has not been adequately explored or discussed;

Be it resolved that the New Jersey District congregations direct the District to offer teaching and training on this important issue; that we direct our pastors, pastoral conference(s) and circuits to spend some time discussing at length, not just sexual harassment, but related issues as well.

We ask now that the district and her clergy give attention to the following issues:

What is sexual harassment? Do we all know it when it happens? Are we agreed on what it is and what it isn't? What is the district's responsibility and liability?

Where are the lines of casual banter and conversation among friends, and between coworkers? How do we address one another when it happens?

How is the district (president) supposed to supervise its pastors, workers and congregations in this matter? How do congregations exercise supervision of volunteers and support staff?

How can the District instruct congregations in providing adequate liability coverage?

Be it Resolved that the NJD in order to protect herself, and to set an example for her congregations offer a day-long event (retreat or seminar) on the issue of sexual harassment.

We should seek advice and input from Synod personnel, from the insurance industry, lawyers, police and others who have something intelligent to offer.

Not only should pastors should be <u>required</u> to attend, but also retired clergy who may serve vacancies or as pulpit supply to congregations. Deacons, office workers and especially youth workers should also be in attendance.

Be it further resolved that such teaching be offered, if not required, within 18 (eighteen) months of the passage of this resolution, and periodically thereafter.

And be it further resolved that clergy who from time to time enter our district be made aware of polices that come as a result of these events.

Resolved, That the church's workers of the New Jersey District be encouraged to care for themselves in every aspect of holistic well-being so that they can continue to serve to the best of their ability with the gifts and strength that God supplies.

To Direct the President of Synod to Assure the Provisions of Bylaw 3.9.2.2 (c) Are Followed

WHEREAS, Overture 2-04 (To Overrule CCM Opinion 14-2724)¹ was not brought forward for debate at the 2016 LCMS National Convention; and

¹ TO OVERRULE CCM OPINION 14-2724

WHEREAS, the Word of God (Acts 13) clearly reveals that in the first century of the New Testament, a local congregation of believers in the Lord Jesus, assembled in Antioch, after much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, freely consecrated and sent missionaries, notably Barnabas and Saul, into mission fields; and

WHEREAS, Article III. 2 of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod identifies an objective of the Synod as to "Strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;" and

WHEREAS, Article VII of the Constitution of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod states, "In relation to its members, the Synod is not an ecclesiastical government exercising legislative or coercive powers, and with respect to the individual congregation's right of self-government it is but an advisory body"; and

WHEREAS, Article XIV of the Constitution states, "The Synod in convention may adopt bylaws that are consistent with and do not contradict the Constitution of the Synod, which controls and supersedes such bylaws and all other rules and regulations of the Synod"; and

WHEREAS, 2010 Synod Convention Res. 8-32B encourages the Synod to study Article VII of the Constitution, including study of "Congregations and Synod, Background Material on the Advisory Nature of the LCMS" along with opinions of the Commission on Constitutional Matters related to this topic (including CCM Opinion 09-2573 listed in a "Whereas" paragraph in Resolution 8-32B); and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-10A in a "Resolved" clause states that The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod reaffirms that its synodical polity is essentially and principally congregational in nature; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 09-2573 states in part that "... there is a common understanding that a congregation exercises its self-government... . in carrying out... its own ministry programs and financial affairs...."; and

WHEREAS, Synod Bylaw 3.8.3 deals only with who has authority to send ministers of religion and other workers into Synod foreign mission fields, and prior bylaws have been careful not to restrict congregational activity specifically relating to whom congregations could send funds overseas, and nothing in the current bylaws restrict or could restrict the right of member congregations to (a) fund ministries in foreign countries, or (b) send/fund congregation members for service with organizations seeking to share the Gospel; and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-37 amending the bylaws only dealt with who on behalf of Synod as a whole could send missionaries at the expense of the Synod, and where the restriction applied, it being a sending bylaw only, clearly not applicable to congregations in any event; and

- 16 WHEREAS, Sexually demeaning speech of any kind normalizes the denigration of others; and

- WHEREAS, The holiness of our triune God and the gospel of Jesus Christ require the highest
 levels of integrity in personal, family, ministerial, and business relations; and

12 13 14	WHEREAS, Any claim that there is something about the nature of another human being as such that renders that person to be of inferior value not only denies the biblical doctrine of creation, but also calls into question what the Scriptures teach about the incarnation of Jesus Christ; ¹ and
15 16	WHEREAS, The Apostle Peter said, "God doesn't show favoritism, but in every nation the person who fears Him and does what is right is acceptable to Him" (Acts 10:34–35); and

Statement of Vision for the Presidency of the NJ District Rev. Stephen Gewecke

The practical expression of District faces in two directions. From the Synodical perspective a District is "Synod in this place." As such the District is an extension of the Synod or the local presence of the Synod among us. However, from the front steps of your church, District will have a different look. Congregations desire District to be a source of identity and unity, a means of accountability, a resource in times of need, and perhaps even a source of inspiration.

To this end, we would do well to work on fostering an ever greater sense of unity among us. The Scriptures talk about us being the family or household of God. We certainly find that expressed in our congregations. We regularly turn to one another for fellowship, care, and encouragement. Yet doesn't this identity extend beyond our congregations to our District, Synod, and even all of Christ's Church? We would do well, not only to speak of this truth but, to practice it. We would do well to intentionally foster collegiality among our pastors in learning communities, circuit meetings, and pastor's conferences. Our congregations will only find a healthy and positive identity in District as our pastors bear this attitude in themselves and their ministry. Then leaders and members of our congregations can begin to catch and take up this identity.

It would also serve us well to work on communications between our congregations and the District. A number of years ago there was a Districtwide event that greatly impacted me. It revealed that people loved and deeply cared about their District. The passion was palpable. But at the same time there was a high level of frustration among them regarding the relationship between congregations and District. People felt disconnected from the District. That dialog was strangely encouraging to me because the beginning of change is to be found in unrest. Since that time we have made strides toward greater connectedness but still more may be done. Through congregational visitation, information sharing sessions with lay leaders, training sessions, celebrations, and keen responsiveness in communication, we can continue to build goodwill and joy in our relationship of congregation and District.

Third, we will want to look to reap the benefits of an emphasis on increasing the vitality and health of our congregations and District. Efforts to begin new ministry and plant new congregations has begun among us through the Kairos Network. We will want to encourage and support this work. At the same time, we will want to encourage the vitality of <u>all</u> our existing congregations. New models of partnership in ministry can be explored to foster, strengthen, and invigorate the proclamation of the gospel in every corner of New Jersey. We will also want to place an emphasis on revitalizing our District Councils to help foster the work of our congregations. In particular, we can endeavor to reconstitute the work of the Outreach and Congregational Services Councils which have been virtually dormant in recent years.

May our heavenly Father grant us his grace to continue the proclamation of the gospel here in NJ and enable us by his Holy Spirit to be strong and bold on behalf of Jesus Christ.

A Ministry Vision for the New Jersey District Rev. Dr. Anthony Steinbronn

For the past six years, you have given me the great privilege of serving as your District President; if I would be elected to a third and final term, these thoughts would guide my ministry in your midst.

The vision of the church is given to us from Christ, who is the Head of the Church...and He has given us a Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20; Luke 24:46-49) and a Great Commandment (Matthew 25:31-45; Luke 10:25-37; John 13:34-35; 1 John 4:7-12, 19-21).

The vision of our Lord for His people is simple and clear: "go and make disciples of all nations." Throughout His ministry, Jesus called disciples to Himself and taught them many things about being one of His disciples. Jesus summarized this life of discipleship in this way: "a wise person is someone who hears these words of Mine and puts them into practice" (Matthew 7:24-27); and identified two fundamental practices of a disciple when He said: "if you hold to <u>My teaching</u>, you are really My disciples" (John 8:31-32) and "if you <u>love one another</u>" (John 13:34-35).

In response to these words of Jesus, the first major focus of the District will be to increase <u>the biblical literacy</u> of His people through the teaching ministry of the District's *Leaders and Learners* program and through the leadership of the *Congregation Services' Council*. During the next three years, there will be frequent training events involving these resources: the *Divine Drama* (with notes from the *Bethel Bible Series*), *fifty stories that every Christian should know*, and *the parables of Jesus* so that we can grow in our knowledge of the Scriptures, possess a comprehensive understanding of His story, make sense of our story in light of His story and how we are to live as His people in the 21st century.

In response to these words of Jesus, the second major focus of the District will be to equip His people in how to <u>share His story</u> of salvation in Jesus Christ with others through the teaching ministry of the District's *Leaders and Learners* program and through the leadership of the *Outreach Council*. During the next three years, there will be frequent training events involving these resources: *the LASSIE method of witnessing the Gospel* (Rev. Mark Woods), *how did Jesus do evangelism* and *life is all about stories: helping people make sense of their story in light of His story* (Rev. Dr. Anthony Steinbronn), *joining Jesus on His mission: how to be an everyday missionary* (Rev. Greg Finke); and *the mission leadership series* -- six, one-day workshops designed to form disciples in their life as a missionary (the six workshops are outlined in strategic focus #5 of my convention report).

In response to these words of Jesus, the third major focus of the District will be for me to personally, and frequently, <u>visit</u> the pastors and congregations of the District so that they might be encouraged and strengthened in their ministry of Word and Sacrament -- being joined in this visitation ministry by the other members of the District's *Growth Council* (three Vice-Presidents and six Circuit Visitors) – and, when invited to do so, to <u>assist</u> the pastors and congregations in <u>addressing</u> the <u>pressing issues</u> and <u>ministry opportunities</u> that they have through a threefold process: (1) <u>identifying</u> and <u>stating</u> the pressing issues and adaptive challenges that we are facing together; (2) <u>thinking biblically</u> and <u>theologically</u> about these issues and opportunities and <u>discovering together</u> what the Scriptures have to say about these things (since all theology and ministry practices are normed by God's Word); and (3) <u>formulating a ministry plan</u> that is <u>congregationally owned</u> and <u>constructed</u>, a ministry plan that is dentifies the <u>next steps</u> to be taken and how to go about implementing those steps so that we, along with many others, will be blessed in our future life together.

A final thought from Martin Luther -- the Christian life can be summarized in two words: <u>faith</u> and <u>love</u> whereby every believer is placed midway between God and one's neighbor, becoming God's instrument of blessing through their <u>witnessing</u> of the Gospel and deeds of <u>love</u>, <u>compassion</u> and <u>mercy</u>.





WHEREAS, 2010 Synod Convention Res. 8-32B encourages the Synod to study Article VII of the Constitution, including study of "Congregations and Synod, Background Material on the Advisory Nature of the LCMS" along with opinions of the Commission on Constitutional Matters related to this topic (including CCM Opinion 09-2573 listed in a "Whereas" paragraph in Resolution 8-32B); and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-10A in a "Resolved" clause states that The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod reaffirms that its synodical polity is essentially and principally congregational in nature; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 09-2573 states in part that "... there is a common understanding that a congregation exercises its self-government... . in carrying out ... its own ministry programs and financial affairs"; and

WHEREAS, Synod Bylaw 3.8.3 deals only with who has authority to send ministers of religion and other workers into Synod foreign mission fields, and prior bylaws have been careful not to restrict congregational activity specifically relating to whom congregations could send funds overseas, and nothing in the current bylaws restrict or could restrict the right of member congregations to (a) fund ministries in foreign countries, or (b) send/fund congregation members for service with organizations seeking to share the Gospel; and

WHEREAS, 1983 Synod Convention Res. 5-37 amending the bylaws only dealt with who on behalf of Synod as a whole could send missionaries at the expense of the Synod, and where the restriction applied, it being a sending bylaw only, clearly not applicable to congregations in any event; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 referring to 2013 Synod Convention Res. 1-08, "To Work Together in Mission," called for a two-fold response: First, "Resolved, That the Synod, by the next convention, develop and provide a mission best practices policy document for districts and congregations engaged in mission projects to assist them to better carry out their mission and their life together", indicating that districts and congregations have and are recognized to have mission work and practices of their own, and because they have their own mission work and practices, the Synod should assist and support those efforts by developing a best-practices policy; and second, "that these best practices include encouragement to districts and congregations to communicate their international mission activities to the Synod's Director of Church Relations and Offices of National and International Mission for the purposes of healthy coordination and stewardship" (underlined portions indicate emphasis added), indicating that districts and congregations can have their own mission activities and when they do they are encouraged to communicate these activities to the Synod for coordination and good stewardship; and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 states in part, "Congregations may not send funds to mission societies and non-Synod entities for work in foreign areas without taking into consideration policies developed and determined for this purpose by the Board of International Mission as the only sending agency;" and

WHEREAS, CCM Opinion 14-2724 incorrectly restricts the mission outreach of congregations and others to give bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world; therefore be it

Resolved, That the congregations of the Texas District and of The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod be encouraged, with much prayer and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to send missionaries to foreign areas; and be it further

Resolved, That the Texas District affirms and encourages congregations, auxiliaries, recognized service organizations, districts, and individual members of the Synod, in their efforts to give bold witness by word and deed, to the love and work of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness to all the world; and be it further

- 16 WHEREAS, Sexually demeaning speech of any kind normalizes the denigration of others; and

WHEREAS, Believers are the salt of the earth and the light of the world so that our actions will
glorify our Father in heaven (Matt. 5:13-14); and

- WHEREAS, The holiness of our triune God and the gospel of Jesus Christ require the highestlevels of integrity in personal, family, ministerial, and business relations; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Ministers serve as trusted members of the community, in public ministry, in 22 personal and family counseling contexts, and as private citizens; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The erosion of moral fidelity has reached crisis proportions in our society; and

2 To Engage in Ministry to Transgendered Persons

WHEREAS, All persons are created in God's image and are made to glorify Him (Gen. 1:27; Isa.
43:7); and

5 WHEREAS, God's design was the creation of two distinct and complementary sexes, male and 6 female (Gen. 1:27; Matt. 19:4; Mk 10:6;) which designate the fundamental distinction that God 7 has embedded in the very biology of the human race; and

8 WHEREAS, Distinctions in masculine and feminine as ordained by God are part of the created
9 order and should find expression in every human heart (Gen 2:18, 21–24; 1 Cor 11:7–9; Eph
10 5:22–33; 1 Tim 2:12–14); and

- WHEREAS, The Fall of man into sin has introduced brokenness and futility into God's good
 creation (Gen 3:1–24; Rom 8:20); and
- WHEREAS, According to a 2016 study from the UCLA School of Law, about 1.4 million
 Americans identify as transgender; and
- WHEREAS, Transgenderism differs from hermaphroditism or intersexualism in that the sex of
 the individual is not biologically ambiguous but psychologically ambiguous; and
- WHEREAS, The state of New Jersey prohibits licensed counselors from any attempt to change achild's "gender expression"; and
- 19 WHEREAS, the church does not have a good history of ministering to transgendered persons
- 20 often due to our uncomfortablity with the topic or to the harsh, unloving, hypocritical manner in
- 21 which we speak often while refusing to speak publicly against other sexual sins such as divorce,
- 22 remarriage, pornography, sexual harassment, coarse language, etc, and
- WHEREAS, the CTCR has produced a 2014 paper entitled, "Gender Identity Disorder or Gender
 Dysphoria in Christian Perspective" which begins to address this topic; now, therefore, be it
- 25 *Resolved*, That the NJ District in convention affirm God's good design that gender identity is
- determined by biological sex and not by one's self-perception—a perception which is often
- influenced by fallen human nature in ways contrary to God's design (Eph. 4:17–18); and be

- *Resolved*, That we commend the CTCR for their current work and request they produce a full
 study on practical ministry to transgendered persons, and be it
- 31 Resolved, That we grieve the reality of human fallenness which can result in manifestations of
- 32 sexuality outside of the teaching of Scripture and point all to the redemption of our bodies in 33 Christ (Rom, 8:23); and ho it further
- 33 Christ (Rom. 8:23); and be it further
- *Resolved,* That we extend love and compassion to those whose sexual self-understanding is
- 35 shaped by a distressing conflict between their biological sex and their gender identity; and be it 36 further
- 37 Resolved, That we invite all transgender persons to trust in Christ and to experience renewal in

the Gospel (1 Tim 1:15–16); and be it further

39 Resolved, That we love our transgender neighbors, seek their good always, welcome them to our

- 40 churches and, as they repent and believe in Christ, receive them into church membership
- 41 (2 Cor. 5:18–20; Gal. 5:14); and be it further
- *Resolved,* That we regard our transgender neighbors as image-bearers of God and therefore
 condemn acts of abuse or bullying committed against them; and be it further
- *Resolved*, That we oppose efforts to alter one's bodily identity (e.g., cross-sex hormone therapy,
 gender reassignment surgery) to refashion it to conform with one's perceived gender identity; and
 be it further
- *Resolved*, That we continue to oppose steadfastly all efforts by any governing official or body to
 validate transgender identity as morally praiseworthy (Isa. 5:20); and be it further

Statement of Vision for the Presidency of the NJ District Rev. Stephen Gewecke

The practical expression of District faces in two directions. From the Synodical perspective a District is "Synod in this place." As such the District is an extension of the Synod or the local presence of the Synod among us. However, from the front steps of your church, District will have a different look. Congregations desire District to be a source of identity and unity, a means of accountability, a resource in times of need, and perhaps even a source of inspiration.

To this end, we would do well to work on fostering an ever greater sense of unity among us. The Scriptures talk about us being the family or household of God. We certainly find that expressed in our congregations. We regularly turn to one another for fellowship, care, and encouragement. Yet doesn't this identity extend beyond our congregations to our District, Synod, and even all of Christ's Church? We would do well, not only to speak of this truth but, to practice it. We would do well to intentionally foster collegiality among our pastors in learning communities, circuit meetings, and pastor's conferences. Our congregations will only find a healthy and positive identity in District as our pastors bear this attitude in themselves and their ministry. Then leaders and members of our congregations can begin to catch and take up this identity.

It would also serve us well to work on communications between our congregations and the District. A number of years ago there was a Districtwide event that greatly impacted me. It revealed that people loved and deeply cared about their District. The passion was palpable. But at the same time there was a high level of frustration among them regarding the relationship between congregations and District. People felt disconnected from the District. That dialog was strangely encouraging to me because the beginning of change is to be found in unrest. Since that time we have made strides toward greater connectedness but still more may be done. Through congregational visitation, information sharing sessions with lay leaders, training sessions, celebrations, and keen responsiveness in communication, we can continue to build goodwill and joy in our relationship of congregation and District.

Third, we will want to look to reap the benefits of an emphasis on increasing the vitality and health of our congregations and District. Efforts to begin new ministry and plant new congregations has begun among us through the Kairos Network. We will want to encourage and support this work. At the same time, we will want to encourage the vitality of <u>all</u> our existing congregations. New models of partnership in ministry can be explored to foster, strengthen, and invigorate the proclamation of the gospel in every corner of New Jersey. We will also want to place an emphasis on revitalizing our District Councils to help foster the work of our congregations. In particular, we can endeavor to reconstitute the work of the Outreach and Congregational Services Councils which have been virtually dormant in recent years.

May our heavenly Father grant us his grace to continue the proclamation of the gospel here in NJ and enable us by his Holy Spirit to be strong and bold on behalf of Jesus Christ.

A Ministry Vision for the New Jersey District Rev. Dr. Anthony Steinbronn

For the past six years, you have given me the great privilege of serving as your District President; if I would be elected to a third and final term, these thoughts would guide my ministry in your midst.

The vision of the church is given to us from Christ, who is the Head of the Church...and He has given us a Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20; Luke 24:46-49) and a Great Commandment (Matthew 25:31-45; Luke 10:25-37; John 13:34-35; 1 John 4:7-12, 19-21).

The vision of our Lord for His people is simple and clear: "go and make disciples of all nations." Throughout His ministry, Jesus called disciples to Himself and taught them many things about being one of His disciples. Jesus summarized this life of discipleship in this way: "a wise person is someone who hears these words of Mine and puts them into practice" (Matthew 7:24-27); and identified two fundamental practices of a disciple when He said: "if you hold to <u>My teaching</u>, you are really My disciples" (John 8:31-32) and "if you <u>love one another</u>" (John 13:34-35).

In response to these words of Jesus, the first major focus of the District will be to increase <u>the biblical literacy</u> of His people through the teaching ministry of the District's *Leaders and Learners* program and through the leadership of the *Congregation Services' Council*. During the next three years, there will be frequent training events involving these resources: the *Divine Drama* (with notes from the *Bethel Bible Series*), *fifty stories that every Christian should know*, and *the parables of Jesus* so that we can grow in our knowledge of the Scriptures, possess a comprehensive understanding of His story, make sense of our story in light of His story and how we are to live as His people in the 21st century.

In response to these words of Jesus, the second major focus of the District will be to equip His people in how to <u>share His story</u> of salvation in Jesus Christ with others through the teaching ministry of the District's *Leaders and Learners* program and through the leadership of the *Outreach Council*. During the next three years, there will be frequent training events involving these resources: *the LASSIE method of witnessing the Gospel* (Rev. Mark Woods), *how did Jesus do evangelism* and *life is all about stories: helping people make sense of their story in light of His story* (Rev. Dr. Anthony Steinbronn), *joining Jesus on His mission: how to be an everyday missionary* (Rev. Greg Finke); and *the mission leadership series* -- six, one-day workshops designed to form disciples in their life as a missionary (the six workshops are outlined in strategic focus #5 of my convention report).

In response to these words of Jesus, the third major focus of the District will be for me to personally, and frequently, <u>visit</u> the pastors and congregations of the District so that they might be encouraged and strengthened in their ministry of Word and Sacrament -- being joined in this visitation ministry by the other members of the District's *Growth Council* (three Vice-Presidents and six Circuit Visitors) – and, when invited to do so, to <u>assist</u> the pastors and congregations in <u>addressing</u> the <u>pressing issues</u> and <u>ministry opportunities</u> that they have through a threefold process: (1) <u>identifying</u> and <u>stating</u> the pressing issues and adaptive challenges that we are facing together; (2) <u>thinking biblically</u> and <u>theologically</u> about these issues and opportunities and <u>discovering together</u> what the Scriptures have to say about these things (since all theology and ministry practices are normed by God's Word); and (3) <u>formulating a ministry plan</u> that is <u>congregationally owned</u> and <u>constructed</u>, a ministry plan that is dentifies the <u>next steps</u> to be taken and how to go about implementing those steps so that we, along with many others, will be blessed in our future life together.

A final thought from Martin Luther -- the Christian life can be summarized in two words: <u>faith</u> and <u>love</u> whereby every believer is placed midway between God and one's neighbor, becoming God's instrument of blessing through their <u>witnessing</u> of the Gospel and deeds of <u>love</u>, <u>compassion</u> and <u>mercy</u>.




